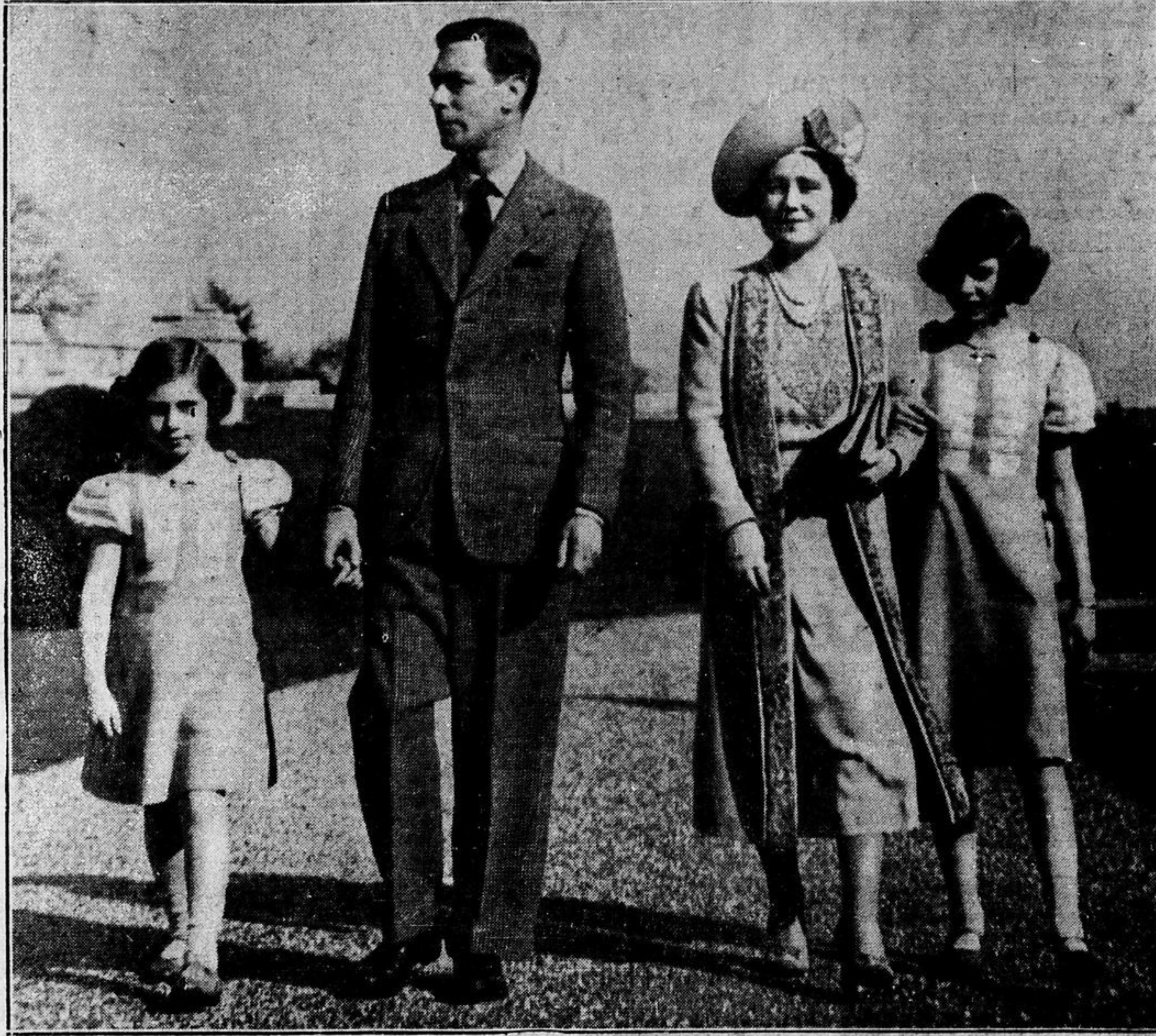


The North Welcomes the King and Queen to Canada

Queen is Noted for Her Grace -- Charm

Knows Home Problems. Is Interested in People.

London, England.—In Queen Elizabeth Canadians will meet a devoted mother and a thrifty housewife. They will see that famous smile with which she has won her way into the hearts of all the people of the Empire. They will appreciate her gracious, friendly manner which frequently has set nervous and flustered officials at their ease.

Canadian women will find the Queen full of questions about how children in the Dominion are brought up, disciplined, educated and so forth. She has always taken great care to see her own children are not spoiled. They are being brought up as ordinary British children are brought up. The inevitable formality of the court has been kept down to the minimum so far as the princesses are concerned.

As a housewife the Queen will find plenty to interest her in the Dominion. She began serious housekeeping as a girl of 21 in rambling old Glamis Castle in 1921. Her mother, the Countess of Strathmore, was ill and the Lady Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon, as she then was, had to run the castle.

Likes Plain Food
Queen Elizabeth will be curious about the meals Canadian housewives provide. She likes plain, wholesome fare herself rather than elaborately prepared dishes.

During the tour she is likely to taste some of New Brunswick's justly famous salmon, and will be able to compare it with the Scottish variety she already knows. At tea-time in various places along the royal route there is sure to be shortbread to remind Her Majesty of her Scottish home.

Wherever she goes the Queen wants to know how people live, the sort of food they buy, how they furnish their homes. Typical of her interest in such domestic details was a visit she paid with the King to a Tyneside housing estate last winter.

In one cottage she asked how the fireplace and stove worked, praised the polished brass work and admired the china tea set and spotless tablecloth set out in her honour.

Speaks French
With French-speaking Canadians Queen Elizabeth will be perfectly at home. She speaks French fluently, has done ever since she was 10. Canadians will hear in both languages when she speaks at an Empire Day broadcast in Winnipeg.

The Queen is an animated conversationalist. Joseph Kennedy, the United States ambassador, spoke of her as one of the most intelligent women he had ever met after a week-end at Windsor Castle. Dorothy Heneker—well-known Montreal executive of international business women's organizations—meeting her at Lady Astor's, was called upon to explain the intricacies of women's committee work at Geneva.

"She told me she was not clever, so I was to make my explanations as simple as possible," Miss said. "But I found her remarkably well-informed with a quick brain and remarkable understanding. She took in the vast project in a short time and questioned me closely on important details."

Music and ballet are two of the Queen's closest interests. She comes from a musical family—her father, Lord Strathmore, organized a glee chorus in his household—and she frequently plays the piano for the enjoyment of her husband and children. Royal patronage of the ballet in this reign has caused a distinct revival of this art in London.

Knows Home Problems
Her Majesty's domestic qualities enable her to meet the housewife on her own ground. During her tours of the various new housing projects in the London suburbs and East End and the working women who show her over their houses—and sometimes ask her to have a cup of tea—say afterward she is "easy to get along with" for she can talk about the advantage of the gas and electric stoves, what bulbs grow best in window boxes and what a difference a gay chintz can make to a room.

Full Council of Six Meets on Monday Night

All Seats Occupied for First Time Since January. Endorse Resolution Asking Dominion Government to Take Care Single Unemployed. New Councillor Protests Board Health Notices to Stable Owners.

For the first time since early in the year all seats around the Council table were filled on Monday evening. Having been duly sworn, Councillors Warren, Spooner and Gauthier took their places along with Councillors Armstrong, McNeil and McCabe.

At the outset of the special meeting Mayor Bartleman asked the new men to disabuse their minds of the impression that Councillors Armstrong, McNeil and McCabe were hard to get along with. There seemed to be an impression in many minds to that effect, he said, and it was not true.

Councillor Armstrong added his hope that all members of Council would work with the utmost co-operation and act like gentlemen if they were forced to disagree. One of the new members of the municipal body, Councillor Spooner, spoke for his colleagues and said that he was sure that they would work harmoniously.

Upon receipt of a letter from the Committee in Aid of Children of Sillcottic Victims, the organization was given permission to hold a tag day on July 11th. The Timmins Council gave its endorsement to a resolution from the Council of the city of London which asked that steps be taken in each municipality to register all single unemployed and have their maintenance taken over by the Dominion Government.

Permission was given the Timmins and District Boy Scouts' Association to hold a torch light parade on the night of May 20th.

A letter from the Porcupine Trades and Labour Council pointed out that decorations, flags, bunting and streamers, were being manufactured in the Fascist countries, Japan, Italy and Germany, and sold in Canada for the King's visit. In view of the fact that the ideals of such countries were hardly in line with the principles of British democracy, it asked that the Council not to buy such decorations.

Councillor Armstrong said that the bunting the Town had bought was manufactured in Sherbrooke, the flags and streamers were manufactured in Toronto and were manufactured in Peterborough. Formal permission was given the Committee in charge of the celebration

on May 22 for a parade. Three petitions—petitions which have no chance whatsoever of being granted this year—were received. One was from residents of Windsor Avenue asking for a sidewalk on the north side from Mountjoy to Wilcox Avenue. The second asked for a sidewalk on the east side of Tamarack Street from Eighth Avenue to Empire Avenue and the third asked for a sewer on Park Avenue from Rea Street to Bellevue Street.

Mayor Bartleman announced after the petition had been read that the decision of the Municipal Board was to grant the Town permission to spend not the \$32,000 it asked for sidewalk construction but \$15,000.

Notices had been sent out to stable owners by the Board of Health to move their stables, said Councillor Gauthier. The notices were peremptory and did not say where the stables should be moved, when or give the Board's authority for such a request. They simply gave owners 30 days to have them moved.

Mayor Bartleman pointed out that the Council had the matter of a full-time Medical Officer of Health for Timmins and Tisdale under discussion. If it went through he believed that such annoyances would no longer exist. "I am on the Board of Health," said the Mayor, "and we have had only one meeting all year. It is up to the Medical Officer of Health to call meetings."

Decision was for the Mayor and Councillor Gauthier to interview Dr. McInnis, the M.O.H. "What of daylight saving?" asked the Mayor. He observed that Councillor McNeil had drawn it to his attention that if the system was adopted in Timmins it would also have to be adopted in Tisdale and possibly Whitney Township. The Council of Tisdale Township will be approached on the matter.

Stores remaining open on the Hollinger pay night was described by Councillor Gauthier as a "real farce." Most of the merchants did not make enough money to pay their light bills observed the new Town Father. He was in favour of enforcing early closing. The matter was deferred.

Re-Draft Standing Council Committees

First Business When Augmented Council Met on Monday Night.

First business of the newly augmented Council was to re-draft standing committees. It was the matter of standing committees which first caused the resignation of three of the elected Councillors early in the year.

At the meeting on Monday night the following Committees were struck, the first name in each is that of the Chairman.

Finance: Councillors Armstrong, Spooner, McCabe.
Public Works: Councillors McNeil, Warren, Armstrong.

Public Relations: Councillors Spooner, Gauthier, McNeil.
Relief: Councillors McCabe, Arm-

strong, Gauthier.
Waterwork: Councillors Gauthier, Warren, Spooner.
Fire and Light: Councillors Warren, McNeil, McCabe.
