Timmins Blanks South End on Friday at the McIntyre

Triple Play Features Contest Won by the Local Nine Six Runs to Nothing. Scorers are Dion, Casey, Reardon, Simpson and Flynn. Flynn's Triple in Second Inning Brings Two Runs in.

Some ball fans go to games all their life and never see a triple play. There certainly has not been one in the camp in many years. One was completed in the ninth inning at McIntyre Stadium on Friday when Timmins defeated Porcupine 6 to 0 in play that involved Dufort, Reardon, McCann and Casey, retired the South Enders in short order on one play.

First man to bat, Dowling, was hit by the pitcher and took a base. Then Moreau hit a hot grounder to between centre and left field. That put two men on bases.

Long came up to bat. He hit a sizzling grounder out to Dufort on second base and forced the play. Dufort scooped up the ball and with an understanding throw scowled it to Reardon who was on second base. That put out Moreau who was on his way to second from first on a forced play. Reardon in turn relayed to McCann on first base to put out Long who was on his way to the initial sack. Not holding the ball a minute, McCann sizzled it down the first base line to Casey at home plate. Casey took the sphere neatly and tagged Dowling out when he was about half a foot from the plate.

It was a perfect play, beautifully timed and well executed.

The rest of the game was not eventful. On the record Flynn was the better man. He allowed four hits as compared to ten Timmins batters obtained from Senese. Flynn struck out six men, Senese, two.

In the second inning Reardon, Timmins short-stop, hit a single to short to start a series of three runs. Simpson got to first on the short stop's error and they both came home when Flynn drove a three-bagger into right field. Flynn himself came in on a wild pitch.

In the third inning Casey went for three bases on Patterson's error in field. He allowed the ball to get away from him. Casey got in on a passed ball.

Dion's two bagger in the third and Dufort's hit to second were responsible for a run. Dion scored.

Reardon hit a double in the eighth inning and came home on Simpson's single.

No Porcupine player got past second base and only three men were left on bases. Put-outs were about evenly divided between fly balls and relays to first base.

Likely New Hotel and Bungalows to be Built at Moosonee

Said to be Same Private Interests That Bought Previous Hotel.

Reports at Cochrane last week were to the effect that a business organization will shortly begin construction of a hotel and bungalow camp at Moosonee to replace the James' Bay Inn which was destroyed by fire late last winter.

It is believed that the same company which operated the \$65,000 James' Bay Inn is behind the replacement program.

T. & N. O. Not Advised
According to North Bay offices of the T. & N. O. Railway claimed nothing official or otherwise had reached railway executives on the Moosonee building program.

Arthur H. Cavanagh, general manager of the T. & N. O., said it was the first time he had heard of it.

Should the James' Bay Inn be replaced it will be necessary to continue rail service to the end of the T. & N. O. steel.

Premier Mitchell F. Hepburn recently declared that for the sake of economical operation of the T. & N. O., the tracks north of Fraserdale would be abandoned.

Destruction by fire of the James' Bay Inn seemed to seal the doom of the line to Moosonee, and Boards of Trade and municipal officers of T. & N. O. towns in the Cochrane district petitioned Queen's Park to make some effort to replace the hotel.

So far, no official commitment has been made by the Hepburn government on building a new summer resort hotel for the railway. Certainly, said
