Special Feature at Palace Theatre June 21 and 22

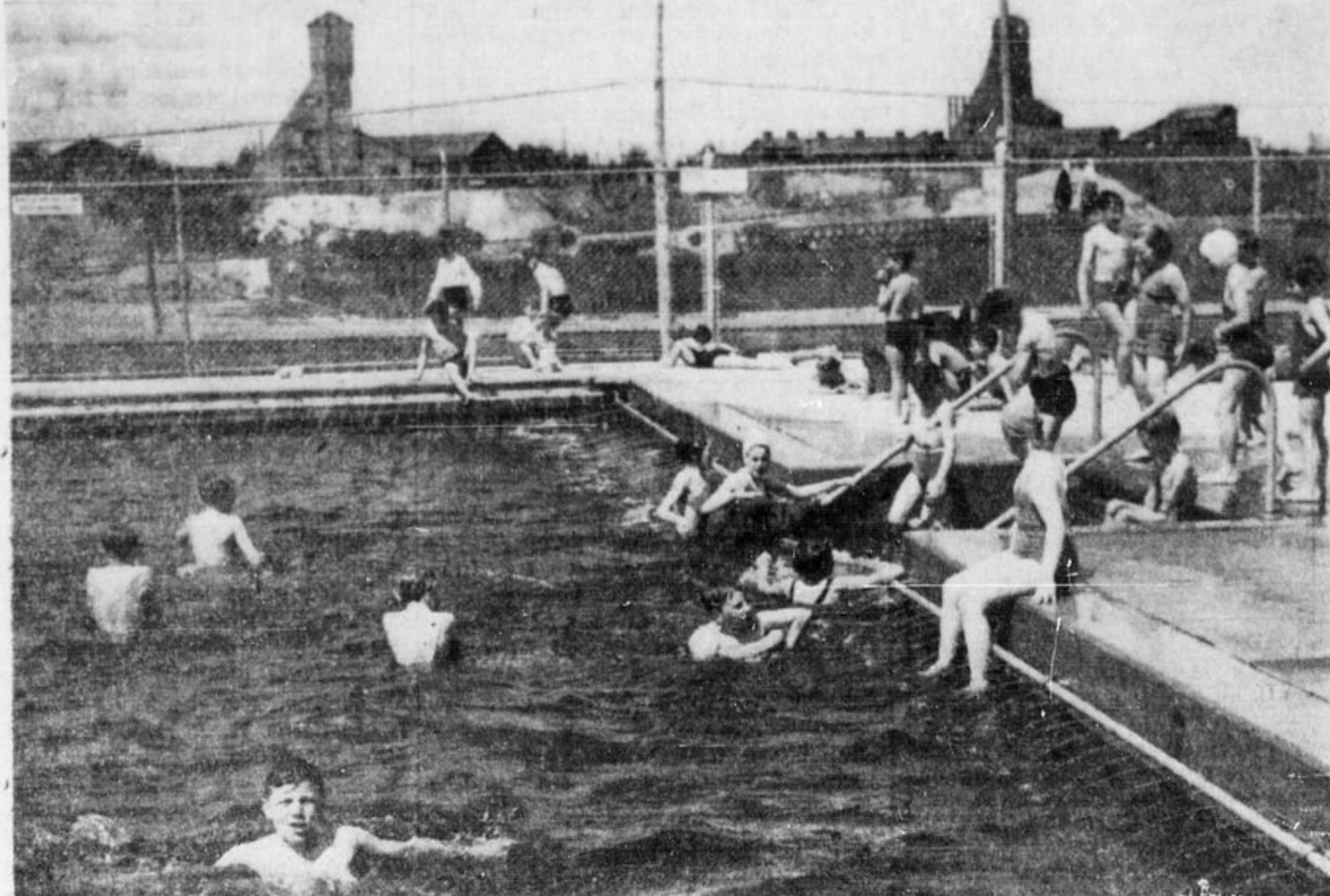
Violin Recital by David Gordon to be Added Attraction
