

McIntyre Wins Five Inning Cup Game in Kirkland

Callery Allows Thrice Defeated Toburn Two Hits For One Marker at Kirkland

Weatherman Joins Forces With McIntyre Team to Defeat Toburn in Ennis Cup Game. Call Game in Sixth Inning and 5-1 Score After Fifth Taken. One of the Largest Crowds of Season Turns Out.

Kirkland Lake Ont., July 10.—(Special to the Advance)—The weatherman joined forces with the McIntyre nine at Community Park to register the third straight defeat of Toburn in the T.B.A. Ennis Cup competition this season. Just when the eastenders were in the middle of a strong comeback in the sixth innings after trailing the Porcupiners 5-1. Old Jupiter Pluvius paid a visit and the game was called with the tying Toburn run on third base. The score reverted back to the fifth the last completed inning, and the verdict went to the Macmen by a convincing 5-1 score. One of the largest baseball crowds of the season turned out to watch the two strong teams in action. Once again the Toburn management did the wrong thing by throwing Russ Hempel a left hander, in against a line up of right hand hitters. Like in the previous Wright - Hargreaves game Hempel was knocked off the mound in the first frame, Russ pulling himself after Moran tripled to left to drive in two runs. Red McCarthy, the youthful flinger from the west, was put in to stop the parade and held the visitors to another run and three hits in the next four and two third innings. After Webber struck out in the first Richardson singled to right and was forced to second when Dunn walked, LaPointe let McNeill's hit go through his legs with Richardson scoring with his hit at this point and he made home when Quinn flied out to right. The only run scored against McCarthy was unearned and came in the fourth. Webber walked and stole second and then made home on wild throws by Campbell and Hillman on plays after Richardson's single to centre.

Timmins Breaks Hollinger's Winning Streak on Saturday

Casey's Double in Fifth Brings in Winning Run. Each Team Scores Pair Early in the Game. Win Gave Timmins Good Hold on League Top Place. Hollinger Dropped to Tie for Second With the McIntyre. Grise Good.

"The Mighty Casey" hit a double in the fifth inning of Saturday's game—a double which broke the deadlock between Timmins and the Hollinger and gave Timmins a one run margin. Timmins scored a run in the first against Zalba and a run in the second against Avery. Both Hollinger runs came in the second inning. It was not until the fifth that Casey's wallop brought McCann in for the winning run. Casey himself got to third on a wild pitch and was left on the base. The win gave Timmins a stranglehold on the first place standing and dropped the Hollinger back again to a tie for second with the McIntyre. Grise pitched good ball for the Timmins squad. N.O.H.A. to Fight Player Ruling to the Limit

W. A. Thompson Makes Announcement in Letter to C.A.H.A. Executive. North Bay, July 7.—"It is our intention to fight to the last ditch for our rights." With this sentence, W. A. Thompson, secretary-treasurer of the Northern Ontario Hockey Association concluded a letter yesterday to W. A. Hewitt, of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association executive. The communication protests the C.A.H.A. ruling that John McCree, Dick Kowcinak and Mel Snowden of trail, are ineligible for play next winter with Lake Shore Blue Devils at Kirkland Lake. Submits Statement Mr. Thompson submitted a statement signed by the trio which declared that they would have reported at Kirkland Lake before May 15 had they not been delayed at Trail for a complimentary dinner tendered the 1938-39 Trail team which represented the Dominion in European contests. They explained they remained for the dinner on an interpretation of the residence rule by the president of the British Columbia division of the C. A. H. A. The N. O. H. A. secretary also submitted that the new May 15 residence rule was actually not made effective on players like the Trail until late in June. He also asked how it could be made retroactive without the various branches of the Canadian association being advised. The first notification of the new interpretation came when it was ruled that the Trail trio could not qualify for participation in N. O. H. A. play. Needed More Time Mr. Thompson had learned that revision of the residence rule was referred from the annual meeting to a sub-committee. He said the latter group did not convene until well in June and then set May 15 as the last moving date. Mr. Thompson contended that this matter should have been dealt with prior to May 1 and all members of the association advised immediately a decision was reached. "The difficulty which now confronts us would certainly have been avoided had action been taken at the proper time," he told Mr. Hewitt. In a communication to Mr. Thompson, the O.H.A. secretary, W. A. Hewitt, had advised that he did not attend the C.A.H.A. meeting and had not been advised of the change in the residence deadline. Hewitt didn't offer an opinion on the N.O.H.A. and Lake Shore
