## Tax Rate in Tisdale Tp. Much Reduced This Year

### Public School Rate This Year is 35.6 Mills as Against 54.9 Mills Last Year. Schumacher Rate This Year is 37.4 Mills as Against 1938 When the Rate was 52 Mills.

South Porcupine, July 8th. Special to The Advance.

A special meeting of Tisdale Council on Friday set the tax rate for South Porcupine and Schumacher as follows: For S.S. No. 1 (South Porcupine), 35.6 mills for the current year.

For S.S. No. 2 (Schumacher) 37.4 mills.

Rate for S.S. No. 1 in 1938 was 54.9 mills.

Rate for S.S. No. 2 in 1938 was 52 mills.

This is a notable reduction in rates from previous years, and also Statute Labour amounts, on every individual property (which vary according to total assessments against each property owners) are entirely cancelled.

And this—in spite of the fact that the Judges Court of Revision resulted in reducing the assessment on Mining Lands by 50 per cent.

Tisdale ratepayers will enjoy the general reduction in taxes, and if—as in last year—the payments are divided into three instalment the burden will be lessened.

We understand that the delay in issuing tax-bills is due to the final decisions of the Judges' Court of Revision.
