SIFTING THE NEWS

"A political and military measure" was the excuse by Premier Mussolini for clearing all foreigners out of Bolzano province. The measure, he said was directed against "Anti-Facism."

Action was said to have been precipitated because of the action of some of the people in the province against Fascism. Possibly some person in Bolzano read something from a democratic country and wondered why his lot was not as easy. In any event Mussolini is conducting a purge of undesirable elements—that is elements incompatible with regimentation.

Premier Chamberlain has made it plain, at last. An aggression against Danzig, whether by force or "internal change" will be resisted. Such an action, he said was covered by the British guarantee to Poland.

There has for a long time, been dissatisfaction in the British parliament. Members have been wondering what would happen if, by some means, Germany managed to secure control of Danzig by peaceful procedure. Such a procedure was and is not only possible but probable inasmuch as the majority of the members in the Danzig governing body are Nazi controlled.

Premier Chamberlain's statement has made the attitude of the British government clear. In other words, if Danzig is touched by Germany, Britain will go to war. The steadfast attitude adopted by Britain should have a derogatory effect on any impulsive German action.

No airplanes are to be allowed above Chancellor Hitler's Berchtesgarden retreat. Der Fuhrer will not be bothered by the drone of air machines. A circular to that effect has been distributed to the air fleets of the world. No planes for Hitler is the dictum, and in peace time it will be obeyed. If Britain should perchance, adopt the attitude lately taken by dictatorial powers, she would deliberately fly planes over the retreat. It might be a good object lesson for the dictator at that.

The recent visit of the King and Queen has had the effect of killing the doctrine of neutrality in Canada, a Senator believes. An enemy which threatens Canada, he said.

Right now, in the United States, they are having a difficult time deciding whether or not that country will remain neutral in the event of another war. The Senator might take a trip over to the U. S. and propound some of his doctrine there.

Timmins Man Gives Evidence in Case At Gravenhurst

Bracebridge Motorist Committed on Manslaughter Charge.

Gravenhurst, July 12—Jack MacDonald, who gave his home address in Timmins was one of the important witnesses here this week, in the preliminary hearing of Thomas R. Morris, of Bracebridge, on a charge of manslaughter arising out of the death of H. Leonard Palmer, of Toronto in a traffic accident on June 30th on No. 11 highway. Palmer was nearly decapitated when the car which he was driving, and from which he was flung by the force of the impact, rolled over on him, crushing his head between the pavement and the redhot muffler.

After Mr. Goldman, Toronto, the owner of the car driven by Palmer, and Dr. Fisher had given evidence, Jack MacDonald was called to the stand. "Traffic was heavy," he told the court. "Suddenly, below Bracebridge, I saw a northbound car straddle the pavement and then head for us. The crash came. When the car stopped rolling over and over, I found I was all right. So was Gohman. We started looking for Palmer. I looked underneath the running board. I grabbed it and pulled him out. One look at his head was enough to tell me that he was dead. I covered him up."

The witness told the crown attorney that he saw Morris, the driver of the other car. "He was very much intoxicated," MacDonald told the court. "I smelled his breath. He told me he had hit nothing." This evidence was later corroborated by other witnesses. Constable Len Hill, of Gravenhurst, said: "I told Morris that a man had been killed. He took it as a joke and laughed. He was very much intoxicated."

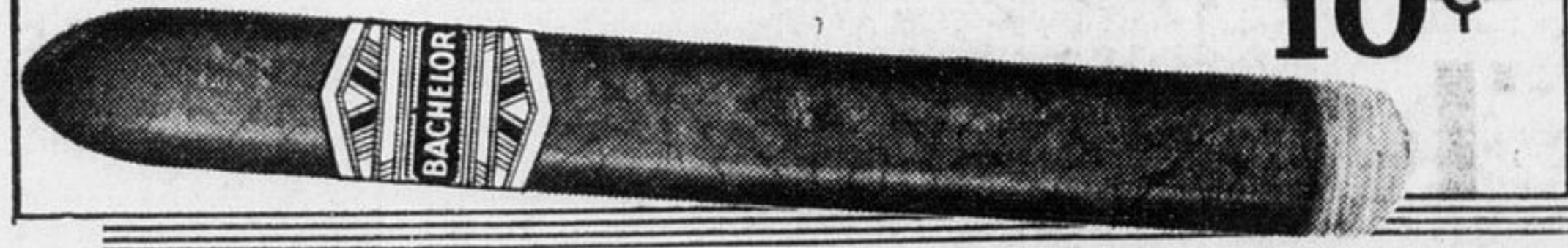
R. M. Best, K.C., for the defence, suggested that MacDonald had hitch-hiked while he had money to pay his fare. He asked MacDonald if his business in Timmins was a prosperous one. MacDonald refused to answer, protesting that all this referred to his private affairs and had nothing to do with the trial.

"You will answer all the questions put to you," Magistrate Thomas told the witness, adding that he had no sympathy with hitch-hikers if they could pay their fare. Finding that MacDonald had hitch-hiked to Gravenhurst for the trial, the Magistrate suggested that he should not be paid the travelling allowance for witnesses. To this the Crown Attorney objected, suggesting that the way Crown witnesses travelled was no concern of the court. MacDonald was paid the allowance.

After the witnesses had been heard the Magistrate committed Morris for trial, the accused being held in custody pending the setting of bail by a judge.
