curated at a small pool north of the compressor plant when Eddie Godin, the little son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Godin of 68 Fourth avenue, lost his life in the water. The lad, who was not yet nine years of age, was playing with a number of other lads along the cyanide dam back of Gillies Lake. Some of the boys had gone out on a log on which they would sit astride and paddle with their feet. Young Eddie was playing in this way on the log, while the other lads were amusing themselves along the lake shore. The lad was alone at the time, the boys having come from another swimming hole and some of his companions having passed him, and others being behind dressing. His chum, Freddie Hill, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. N. Hill, 59 Fourth avenue, noticed him one minute on the log and the next time he looked that way Eddie was not in sight. As the log was some distance out in the water Freddie could not understand where he had gone and enquired of another lad who was nearby but who could not speak good English and simply pointed to the water. A brother of the latter lad was hunted up and explained his young brother meant that Eddie was in the water. Freddie Hill, realizing what had happened, grabbed an old automobile tire to use as a float and jumped into the water and attempted to locate Eddie. Although he failed to rescue his chum young Fred certainly displayed a courage and resource that would do credit to a boy twice his age. Other boys in the group in the meantime notified some who were working on an electric survey party, waded out into the water and after a brief search located the body of little Eddie Godin. The youngster was brought to shore and every possible effort made to bring life back but all was in vain. In the meantime the doctors and police were notified and were promptly on the scene. Skilled efforts to revive the child proved unavailing.

TEN YEARS AGO IN TIMMINS

From data in the Porcupine Advance Files

An accident occurred ten years ago on the Mattagami river that might easily have had fatal results, and the incident should be taken by both motor boat owners and those using canoes on the river to take all reasonable precautions to avoid similar danger at present. It is always better to be safe, than sorry, or drowned. Three young men, Messrs. A. Nelson, P. Elphick and G. Wallingford were returning from having a swim farther up the river. They were in a canoe, and were following the left bank of the river, just near the bend above the bridge. A Hubert's motor boat passed them and the swell from the motor boat upset the canoe. The lads turned the canoe to meet the wave, and ordinarily might have ridden it out safely. The swell in this case however proved too strong, the result being that the canoe was upset in a twinkling and the three occupants were thrown into the river. Mr. Hubert noted the danger of the canoe and promptly swung around and assisted the three men out of the water. None of them were any the worse for the accident, except that they had two swims for the evening, this last one with their clothes on. Also, all of the canoeists lost their bathing suits. While this incident thus passed off without any serious results, it should be noted a warning to motor boat drivers and canoeists alike to avoid the danger from the swells from passing motor boats.

The regular meeting of the town council was held ten years ago with Acting Mayor Councillor A. G. Carson in the chair and Councillors H. Charlebois, P. Dougall, R. Richardson, H. Carson and C. P. Ramsay present. One of the chief matters to be considered was the granting of a site for use by the government for housing the equipment of the mine rescue work station to be established by the Ontario Department of Mines, following recommendations of the royal commission that enquired into the Hollinger disaster of 1928 and the suggestions made by the former chief inspector of mines, Mr. T. Sutherland, then Deputy Minister of Mines. Each mining camp was to have one of these rescue stations, where suitable equipment would be stored and where men would be taught how to use this equipment and what to do in case of mine accidents. It was decided that there would be 25 or 30 boxes of equipment stored here, with a man in charge and also likely a motor truck to rush the appliances to any mine where they might be needed. "It is desired to have the station close to the fire hall," said The Advance at the time "so that it will be easy always to get instant service in response to a call. Part of the building will be used under actual gas conditions and so full confidence be felt by those trained to the work. The Government asked the town for a site, a 15 by 40 addition to the back of the fire hall being suggested, the government to defray all costs of the building and all maintenance costs. The council decided to assist the plan in any reasonable way and to make a personal inspection of the site referred to at the conclusion of the meeting. This was done and the council decided to grant the Government the use of the land
