An alarm was put in immediately after the fire started and a truck set out for the address. A good deal of difficulty was experienced in getting the truck to the scene however, as entry to the townsite can be made not from Cedar street, of which it is the continuation, but only from Pine Street, above.

Finally a hose was laid from Pine Street and a crowd of volunteers assisted in dragging it across the soft, moist turf and back to the house, which is set at the rear of a lot. The fire was soon brough under control but, by that time, the baby's life had been taken by for the Wounded in China
