\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* Recently the anniversary of the second year of the Sino-Japanese war was celebrated. Going into the third year of conflict Japan is still staying to her course to bring all China under her domination.

In a message to his people General Chiang Kai-Shek, of the Chinese army, maintained that Japan was being steadily weakened and that China's strength was growing daily. He figured Japanese casualties in China at 1,000,000, some 940,000 more than are admitted by the Japanese.

Japanese troops in China now number 1,000,000-divided into 33 divisions of 30,000 each and three cavalry brigades. In South China there are three divisions in Central China, 14 and in North China 16.

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
