TEN YEARS AGO IN TIMMINS

From data in the Porcupine Advance Files

The celebration of the glorious Twelfth of July by the Cochrane District Orange Lodges was held ten years ago at Timmins, and proved one of the most successful ever held in the North. There were eleven lodges well represented here for the occasion some of them being practically up to full strength. The lodges taking part included:—Cochrane, Clute, Gardiner, Porcupine Junction, Iroquois Falls, Matheson, Shillington, Connaught, Golden City and Porcupine, Schumacher and Timmins. Between eight and nine hundred people came in from outside places. There were two packed railway cars of people from Cochrane and nearby towns, one full car from Matheson and Shillington, while each train during the morning and on the evening of the eleventh brought in its quota of visitors. It was a busy day for the cafes and hotels. The town was in gala appearance for the occasion in honour of the visitors, the flags being out and otherwise welcome being extended to the visitors from outside. The Englehart pipe band, three pipers and three drummers—two on the snare drums and one on the big drum—came here and played selections at the corner of Third avenue and Spruce street that evening and at various times during the big day, as well as taking a leading place in the parade.

had some private hydrants on their property and permission to use these was obtained, the result being that the fire could be fought much more effectively. Before the blaze was conquered twenty piles of lumber were destroyed, representing all the rough lumber in that section of McChesney's yards. The fire brigade and the fire rangers together with volunteer assistants, put in three solid hours of hard work in subduing the fire. The fire rangers had three pumps going and showed that they were experts at this sort of fire fighting. The Timmins Fire brigade men under Capt. Smith and Jeffrey worked with their usual skill and ability. S. McChesney and Sons publicly expressed the appreciation felt for the work of the Timmins Fire Dept. and the Ontario Forestry Dept. staff. Ten years ago two men reported to the police that they had noticed a man lying unconscious on Balsam street between Third and Fourth avenues, and they thought he had been attacked and might be seriously hurt. The police went at once to the scene and found a man suffering from a beating-up about the head and face and some knife wounds. The injured man proved to be Eino Nieminen, a Finlander employed by Tanner's dairy on the Sandy Falls road. Nieminen was badly beaten about the face and head. In addition he had a knife wound and a deep one it was, on his left arm. To the police he maintained that he did not know his assailant. A doctor was summoned and after the injured man's wounds were dressed, Nieminen was taken to the hospital.

Rhys Jones, a well-known and popular young man who had recently returned from a visit to his old home in Wales, lost his life ten years ago when tons of muck fell on him at the Hollinger mine. The most strenuous efforts were made to dig him out, as large a force of men as possible being put on the work. It was nearly four hours before they were able to get the body free and life was then found to be extinct. For some time after the accident the workmen were understood to have been able to hear the buried man but around an hour after, they were able to get no further replies. From the accounts of the accident heard, it would appear that the unfortunate man was smothered by the fall of the muck, his body not being marked nor bones broken.

Miss Minnie Stevens, one of the popular young ladies of the town, and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. Stevens. The couple were quietly married while away on holiday. Hosts of friends here joined in extending best wishes to the young couple.

The Advance ten years ago: "Last week a party of men taken out to Shaw township by Provincial Officer Hartle found dead the body of Henry Bracker in the river about a mile from his shack. The body was badly decomposed and had been attacked also by some animal or animals. It was identified by means of the clothing, gun and other accessories. Bracker has been one of the well-known men about the camp for a great many years, and as soon as it was known that he had disappeared, parties were organized to search for him. On June 29th two boys were out at his shack and saw a note that Bracker had evidently written. They did not, however, realize the seriousness of the import of the note at the time, thinking that the man would return safely. On July 5th, the boys visiting the shack in Shaw township again, saw the note once more and seeing that the man had very evidently not returned since their first visit, the lads hurried home and informed their mothers, who promptly sent them to them to the police. Provincial Officer Hartle visited the shack at once and found the note which read:—"Rheumatism is too much for me. So goodbye, everybody." It was felt that the Bracker had suffered considerably with rheumatism and it was felt that the note probably indicated the unfortunate man in a fit of despondency and pain had taken his own life. Constable Hartle made a search for the missing man but was not able to find any track of him. On July 11th the officer returned to the scene with a search party of nine men. A systematic and thorough search was organized and about 11:30 in the morning the body was found by two of the party resting partly on some logs in the Redstone river about a mile from his shack. The body was almost completely eaten away. An arm, the left leg and the top half of the head were practically eaten off.
