

RECORD POLICE ACTIVITY SWELLS DOCKET

Police Raiding Squad Roves Town at Week-end Huge Docket for Tuesday

Twenty-five Persons in Jail Charged with Varied Offenses From Keeping For Sale to Being Drunk in Public Place. Many Others Released on Bail. Magistrate Atkinson Faces Largest Docket This Year To-morrow.

One of the largest Liquor Control Act clean-ups that has taken place in Timmins in many months was staged by local police over the week-end. Twenty-five persons were in jail here this morning on all kinds of charges ranging from drunkenness to keeping liquor for sale.

Raiding squads were busy from Friday to early today. They paid official visits to many suspected blind pigs, and combed the streets for drunks and men carrying liquor illegally.

On Friday many drunks were arrested and some of those arrested were charged with illegal possession. Vagrants and suspicious characters were brought in.

Among those picked up on charges of vagrancy was Wild West Couture. Couture has a long and extensive record covering a variety of offenses.

Last night at 9:40 p.m. a raiding squad paid a visit to the home of Carmelo Cuzilla 48 Fourth avenue. This morning Cuzilla faces two charges one of keeping liquor for sale, the other of permitting drunkenness.

Alfred Chartrand, 158 Spruce street, south, has been charged with keeping for sale. He also faces a charge of illegal possession. Found in the same house, Norman Simpson faces a charge of illegal possession of liquor. Police raided the establishment at about four o'clock yesterday morning.

At least a dozen persons are in jail facing charges of being drunk. One man faces a charge of his third offense for drunkenness.

Asked for his address after being picked up by police, one alleged drunk said, "Box Car Apartments."

Provincial police were busy also. As

a result of their efforts, E. Dupont, of Night Hawk Centre, is facing a charge of keeping liquor for sale.

Magistrate Atkinson will preside in police court tomorrow. He returned from his holidays this week. He will face one of the largest dockets seen in Timmins in many a court day. Number of cases should top seventy by considerable.

Charge Follows Accident

Two People Injured When Car Driven by J. H. Karr Crashes Into Parked Truck Early on Sunday.

J. H. Karr, of 5 Kirby avenue, is charged with dangerous driving following an accident near the corner of First avenue and Birch street at 4:45 a.m. on Sunday morning. He will appear before Magistrate Atkinson in police court tomorrow morning.

Karr is alleged to have made a wide turn at the corner and crashed into a truck which was parked at the side of the road.

Eino Pietila, 219 Birch St., who was with him in the car, received an injured shoulder and lower right arm. Miss Dorothy Noonan, 44 Second avenue, another passenger, was badly cut about the face. She was taken to St. Mary's Hospital for treatment.

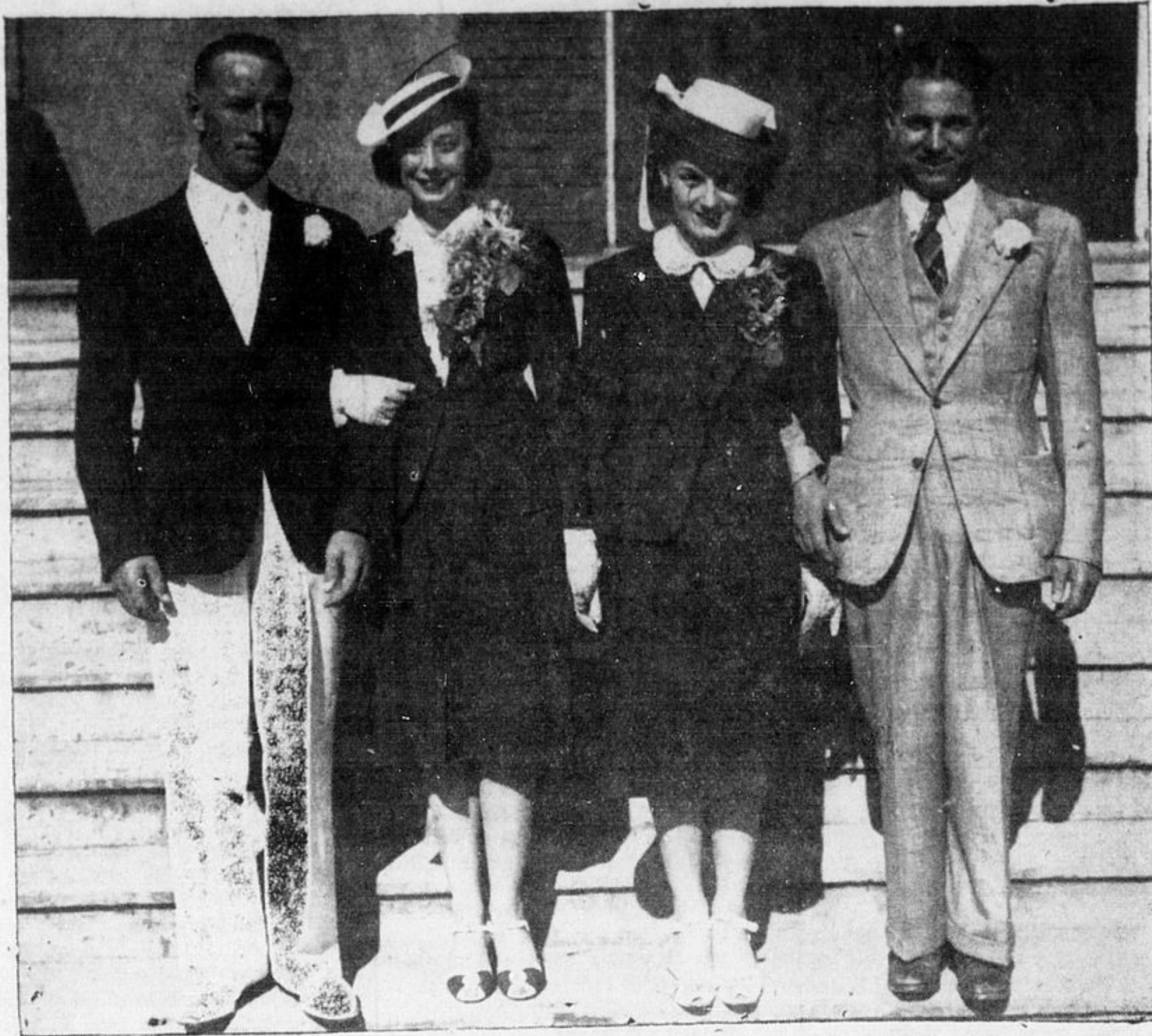

She had been ill for some days before her death and some days ago severed the artery in one of her wrists. She was taken to the hospital and for a time it was thought that she would recover, but she passed away on Friday despite all that surgical and medical skill could do. She is survived by her husband and three children. She was 54 years of age at the time of death. The body is at Hunkin's Funeral Parlours, and the funeral will take place to-morrow afternoon at two o'clock.
