

South Porcupine Eliminated from Play-off Berth

Timmins Takes the Measure of Toburn Here on Thursday

Southern Group Leaders Drop 7-4 Decision to Timmins. Local Team Never Headed. Only Handful of Fans Out to See Game. Red Rodney Got Four for Five, Scored Twice Himself and Brought Berscht Across.

In a game that might well be a preview of the 1939 league play-offs at McIntyre Stadium, Thursday, Timmins took the measure of the southern group leader, the high-stepping Toburn team. The count after nine innings was 7-4. The local team was never headed and only in one inning did the Toburn nine look as though they were going to catch them. Only a handful of the faithful were on hand to see the battle.

"Rod" Rodney who played for Toburn last year was one of the main reasons that Timmins emerged victors. He connected for four safeties in five tries. Hillman got three for four for Toburn. Rodney brought in two runs himself and his two-bagger in the sixth sent Berscht scampering in from first base.

Grise, local southpaw, struck out six men in his nine innings while Luckner, lanky righthander, struck out five. Luckner issued two passes while Grise, as usual, walked none. Toburn had six men stranded on the base paths while Timmins left seven.

Timmins scored two runs in their half of the first inning on a single, a double and a double steal. Rodney singled to left for one base. Dufort doubled to the same spot sending Rodney to third. Dion fled out and Reardon connected for a soft one. On Reardon's hit the play was made on Rodney at the plate but he was safe. With Reardon on first and Dufort on third the double steal was called and it worked. Dufort coming in with the second run, Reardon was left on base as Casey and Simpson fled.

In the third inning Toburn got a couple when the Timmins infield momentarily went haywire. Two errors a scratch single and a double scored both runs. Rice was safe on Reardon's error. Dion juggled Lapointe's hit when he had a perfect set-up for a double play and Lapointe was lodged on first with Rice at second. Hillman tried to knock one out of the park but hit the ball with the handle of his bat with the result that it rolled out in front of the plate. He was safe and the bases were loaded. Pankratz doubled to left field to score Rice and Lapointe and advance Hillman to third. Both men died on the bases when the next two men were easily thrown out at first.

Lapointe singled in the fifth and Hillman followed with a double. Lapointe stopped at third and scored when Dion missed Casey's peg to third. Pankratz and Zuckerman were easy outs to retire the side.

Timmins scored one again in the sixth when Berscht walked and scored from first base on Rodney's double to left. Luckner singled for Toburn in the seventh and advanced to third on Rice's single. He came in when Timmins were doubling on Lapointe and Rice for Toburn's last run.

Timmins added another pair in the lucky seventh when Dion led off with a triple. Reardon was thrown out at first and Dion was held at third. Casey tripled to left field to score Dion. He scored when Lapointe missed the catcher's throw to third. Simpson walked and a stolen base and a wild

pitch put him on third but the next two men struck out.

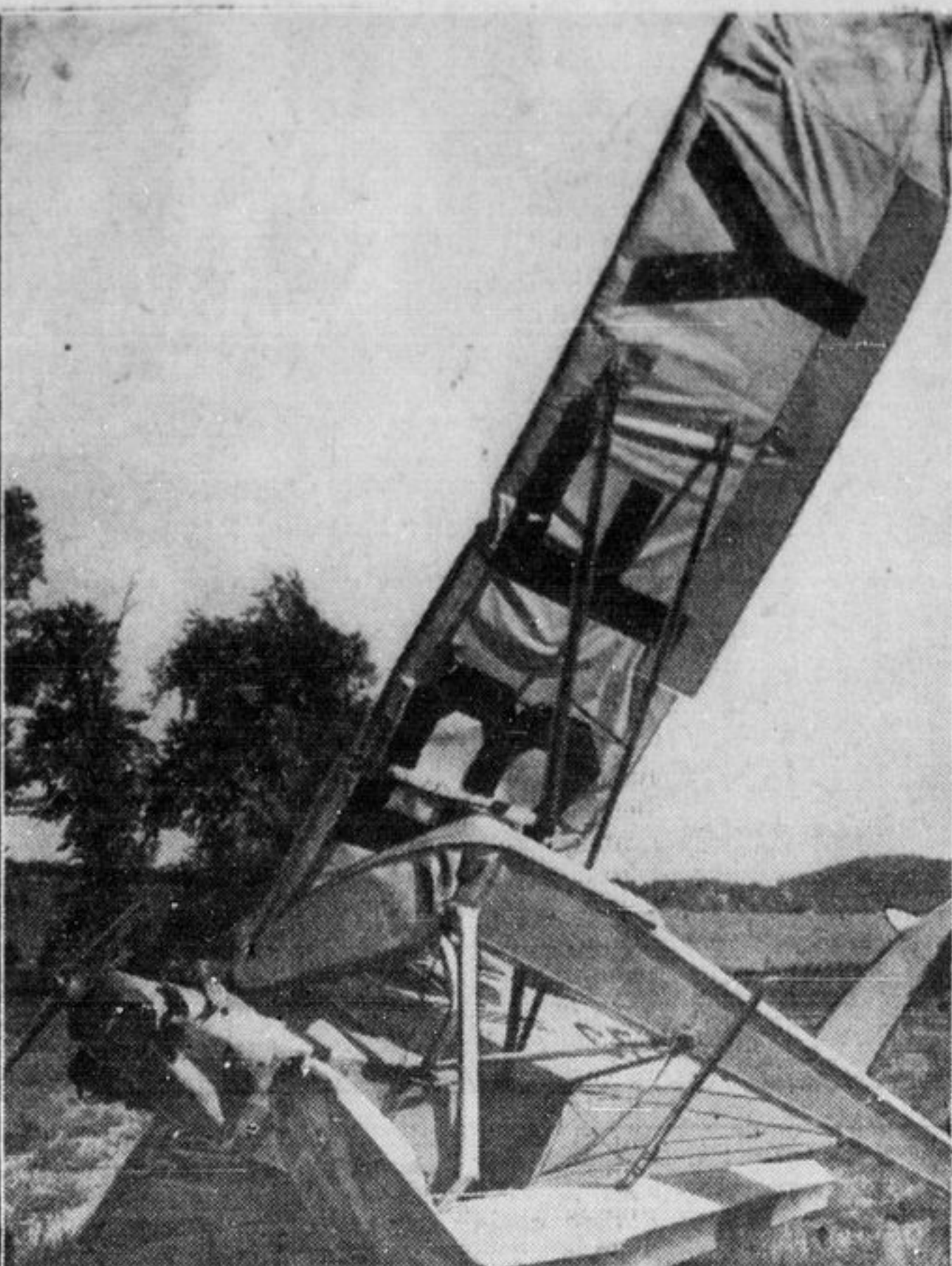
Winners in Ladies' Golf Here Friday Afternoon

Flynn Pitches Timmins to 7th Successive Win Friday

Despite the Fact That He Allowed Nine Hits Against Churchill's Five, Flynn Pulled Himself Out of Any Dangerous Spots. Churchill Making His Debut For a Full Game Was Very Nervous and Excited During First Inning.

Despite the fact that he allowed nine hits, nevertheless Flynn pitched his team to another win in the McIntyre park on Friday. At least twice during the game the big Irishman cheated the McIntyre out of scores by retiring the necessary number of men when the bases were loaded.

Bob Churchill made his debut for a full game with the Macmen. Nervous and excited, Churchill was wild in the first inning. The eighteen year old hurler walked four consecutive men and allowed four runs.

In the second, third, fourth, fifth and sixth he pitched good ball. He wavered again in the seventh when he walked three consecutive men but came back strong in the eighth.

Heavy hitters during the game were Rodney, with two singles, McCann, with a double and a single and Thayer with three singles.

First Timmins half saw Rodney to bat. He hit Churchill for a single to right field. Dufort fled out and with Rodney on first the nervous young pitcher walked Dion and Reardon to load the bases. When Casey walked Rodney came in, walking, and when Simpson took a base on alls, Dion came in. McCann's single brought Reardon and Casey in for four runs.

The game was uneventful until the fourth when McNeill hit a double into left field for the McIntyre. He went to third when Thayer singled and came home when Quinn was thrown out.

Timmins scored again in the sixth. McCann doubled and came in when Flynn hit to Richardson, McIntyre short stop, and Richardson bobbed.

Dunn led off with a single through pitcher's box in the McIntyre half of the sixth. Dion on third made a wild pitch to McCann and McNeill went to second on the error. Thayer singled to bring Dunn home.

A McIntyre double play in the eighth retired the Timmins team in short order. Rodney got on base on a short stop's error and the next man up, Dufort, hit a hot grounder towards short. Richardson picked it up and tossed to Quinn to beat Rodney. Quinn, in turn, passed to McNeill to complete the play.

Carsteels Win Out in Final Over Falcons

Two Tie Games and One Carsteel Victory Give Montreal Right to Represent Eastern Canada.

Montreal, July 29.—Falconbridge Falcons, the soccer team which eliminated the McIntyre Redmen from the Dominion Cup play-offs in a two game series here recently, was defeated by Montreal Carsteels for the Eastern Canada championship in the cup race. The Carsteels won the title on the basis of one victory and two games. Final game was on Friday night. Score was 2 to 2.

The Montreal team, unbeaten in 22 league and play-off games, will meet the winner of the series between Vancouver Radials and Winnipeg Irish for the Dominion title.

All the goals of Friday's game, played in pouring rain, were scored in the second half. Paul Emil Castonguay, Carsteel's scoring ace, who had been blanked in the two previous matches, finally got away from Alex Samson, Falcons' playing manager, and scored twice in the early part of the second half.

Falconbridge fought back gamely and finally evened the score. Bob Hutchinson, Falcons' outside left, tallied first, and Aird, the visitors' inside right, headed in from a corner for the equalizer.

A drizzling rain fell as the teams started playing and became a down-pour midway through the first half, but slackened as half-time approached. The visitors had the better of first-half play, but could not get close enough to Tim Gordon in the Carsteel net.

The home team took the initiative in the second half. Sam Chedzozy got the ball into the net, but it was disallowed for hands. Carsteel came back and after seven minutes Chedzozy gave Castonguay the lead for the opening tally. Moving fast down the field, Carsteel's stocky centre swerved around Samson and crashed the ball into the net. Wallace never moved.

Steel dominated the play and rained shots in on Wallace. Castonguay hit the upright with another drive. The rain started again and the footing became precarious. Falconbridge claimed a penalty on one attack on the Steel goal.

Flurry of Hitting in Timmins South Porcupine Game Saturday

Each Team Gets Eleven Hits in Hectic Five and a Half Inning Game at McIntyre on Saturday. Timmins Scored Six Runs in Second and Four in Third Inning. Porcupine Rallies in Fourth.

As many hits were laid down in five and a half innings of a Timmins-Porcupine ball game at the McIntyre Park on Saturday afternoon as have been made in most nine inning games in the camp this year. The Timmins team won 12 to 8 to more than clinch its first place position on the top of the league. The loss, on the other hand, eliminates South End from any opportunity to get into the finals.

Five pitchers were used, three by Timmins and two by South Porcupine. Timmins went wild in the second inning, against Pitcher Dominus. The locals scored six runs to another the Porcupine pair of counters in the first inning and give the locals a running lead. In the next inning Timmins added four more runs. Surprisingly, the Porcupines came through and laid down a barrage of hits in the fourth to count five runs.

Due to the fact that the field was to be in use at six o'clock it was necessary to call the game after five innings had been played to make it official. Porcupine batted in the first of the sixth but with no results.
