Four teen-aged boys and a comely young girl, members of the Calgary Rifle Club, are the new holders of the coveted junior small bore rifle chamo pionship of Canada. To win the nationo al shooting title the young marksmen defeated 169 of the best junior rifle teams in the Dominion, all of whom competed in the recent Dominion Marksmen Junior Small Bore Rifle League's annual shooting competition.

They then went on to win the highest award among the 845 junior shooters from all parts of Canada who formed the five-man entries. They secured a total of 1479 points out of a possible total of 1500.
