

Grise Pitches Timmins to Win Over Hollinger Monday

Grise Tricks Opposing Pitcher, Zalba, in Last of Ninth Inning. Both Timmins Runs Scored by Second Baseman, Dufort. Hollinger Squad Gets Two Double Plays. Win Puts Timmins Far in Group Lead.

Playing ball with his head as well as with his good left arm, "Lefty" Grise pitched his way to victory on Monday in an encounter with the Hollinger. In the final inning, with three men on bases and three balls on the batter, who was Zalba, Grise put three across to fan the Hollinger pitcher and win the game two to nothing.

Grise tricked Zalba. When there was one strike on the batter and Zalba turned away from the plate—as batters do—between pitched balls, Grise signalled to Casey to have the ball in a hurry. Casey gave it to him and the smart Timmins pitcher put it across for the second strike while the batter's back was still turned to the plate. The third one came in Grise's good time.

Dufort, Timmins second baseman. In the first inning Dufort hit a single past short stop. Dion's double to centre field brought him home.

In the sixth inning Dufort scored again. He singled to left field, got to second on Dion's throw-out and made two bases on Reardon's single.

The Hollinger outfit double played twice. In the third Scarlett, at centre field took Dion's fly and threw to second base to catch Rodney on the way in from first. In the ninth inning Grise hit one to second base. Fargher, on second, to Romualdi, on short to Savoie on first meant two men out.

In the final inning of the game Romualdi got on base on Dufort's error at second. Fargher singled and Yasinchuck followed suit to load the bases. It was then that Grise pulled his trick on Zalba, his opposing pitcher. The trick won the game.

Young Boys and Girls Win Dominion Titles

Four Teen Age Boys and Young Girl From Calgary Win Dominion Marksmanship Trophies

Four teen-aged boys and a comely young girl, members of the Calgary Rifle Club, are the new holders of the coveted junior small bore rifle championship of Canada. To win the national shooting title the young marksmen defeated 169 of the best junior rifle teams in the Dominion, all of whom competed in the recent Dominion Marksmen Junior Small Bore Rifle League's annual shooting competition.

One day last fall, George B. Choquette, a 21-year-old Calgary marksman who had gained considerable shooting experience with the Calgary Regiment (Tank) and the Calgary Rifle Club, was named coach and instructor of the club's junior division. He was placed in charge of a group of some 25 amateurish beginners and told to do what he could with the young marksmen. He did his best—he made them the champions of Canada in less than a year.

But the remarkable fact is that once George decided that competitive shooting should be commenced by the group, he had considerable difficulty in finding a team of five who would enter the Dominion-wide shooting tournament open to five-man teams. These young people, most of them high school students, could not easily spend three or four evenings a week in arduous shooting practice.

Eventually he gathered five recruits together and persuaded them to enter the field. Through the long winter evenings on the indoor range in the basement of the Sanitary Market in Calgary, George coached his charges. They practised faithfully and well. They entered the competition and in the first round won the Alberta provincial championship and the right to represent the province in the finals. They then went on to win the highest award among the 845 junior shooters from all parts of Canada who formed the five-man entries. They secured a total of 1479 points out of a possible total of 1500. Their score was a mere one point larger than that of the Remington Rifle Club of Montreal but it provided the necessary margin of victory.

Scarcely a more youthful team could be chosen than the Calgary winners. The national competition, being held for the 16th year as the oldest of the many competitions sponsored by the Dominion organization, is open to boys and girls under 19 years of age, but the oldest on the Calgary team is only 18. Two of the team's contestants are only 15.

One of the 15-year-olds, Pat J. Robinson, put consecutive shots right bang in the bull's eye during the finals of the competition. The official referee, who watched through a telescope while Pat's shots hit the target, stated that the bullets entered the same hole in dead centre with monotonous regularity, to merit a perfect score of 300 points.

The lone girl on the team is Alma Nerland, 18 years of age, a stenographer in a Calgary dairy. Although she, too, has been using a rifle less than a year, her scores were: 97-98-96, with a final total of 292 points out of a possible 300, a remarkable feat for any person.

Don Jones, the other 15-year-old trigger artist, scored 97-98-99 to finish with a total of 294. His last two shots were the ones that spelled the difference between winning and defeat for the team, but with the coolness of a veteran marksman he fired two perfect bulls.

Melvin Beatty, 17, had a total of 296 with individual scores of 99, 99, and 98. The fifth member of the championship squad, George Whitcher, 17, scored 297, with individual totals of 99, 100 and 98.

In a letter to George Choquette and his championship team, the secretary of the Dominion Marksmen organization congratulated the winners and stated that the competition was the most successful in the association's 24-year history. Each of the contestants will receive a silver medal for winning the provincial title and a gold medal for the Dominion award while Choquette will be awarded a special

instructor's gold medal by Dominion Marksmen.

SIFTING THE NEWS

A further increase in the British navy probably means further headaches to German naval experts. The increase in the size of the navy in the past few months (it has far surpassed the rate of increase of Germany) must be giving those powers with belligerent intentions something to think about.

A flotilla of small but fast boats is planned. They will be used to protect the destroyers and larger navy ships.

Britain recently made a further appeasement move—for which she was much criticized. She advanced the idea that trade treaties and currency loans might be effected between the two countries if Germany was willing to renounce her avowed intention to make war if she did not gain everything she asked in the way of acquisition of colonies and a united central Europe.

However, the move made by Britain towards appeasement differed in many respects from the former appeasement advance made by Premier Chamberlain. The difference was that Britain this time was ready.

It is gracious to make conciliatory gestures when you are as big or bigger than the other fellow. To make the same gesture when you are smaller might be construed as an act of cowardice. Britain may be guilty of both.

The Timmins Town Council, at a recent meeting, passed a resolution authorizing the hiring of an assistant police court clerk at a salary of \$50 a month. What a lot of people fail to understand how a council devoted to the cause of labour and the working man (individual councillors have many times said they were), can justify a salary of \$50 a month.

\$50 a month means \$12.50 a week. Can a man in Timmins live on that amount per week. Most people think not.

Throughout all their meetings this year several of the members of council have been loudly demonstrating their adherence to the cause of the "working man." Yet, this resolution which ordered the payment of \$50 a month to a night police court clerk passed without objection. Why?

Baron Howard of Penrith, member of the British Delegation to the Peace Conference in 1919, and British Ambassador to the United States from 1924 to 1-30, died in Hindhead Surrey, England on Tuesday.

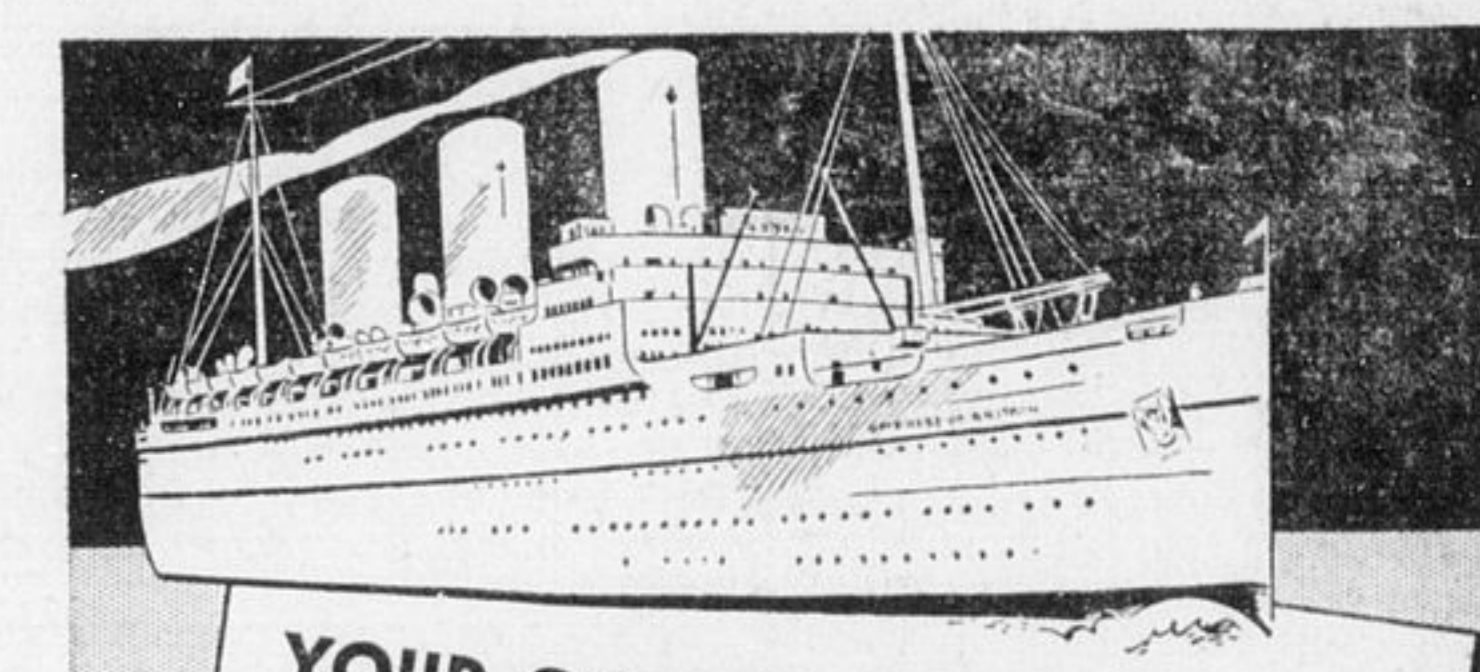
Plan Stronger Ball Cub in Noranda Next Season
