Northern Ontario Junior Boxing Championship

To be Held at Iroquois Falls on Labour Day.

Iroquois Falls, Ont., Aug. 12.—(Special to The Advance)—The Northern Ontario Junior Boxing Championship for the year 1939 will be battled to the finish here, in the Iroquois Falls Arena, on Labour Day, September 4th, from definite information issued by the Labour Day Committee.

This tournament was made possible by official notification, and issuance of a permit to hold this match here, by J. P. Fitzgerald, Secretary of the Ontario Athletic Commission, to Mr. J. Cusack, Northern Ontario Representative of the Athletic Union.

Open to all amateur boxers, under the age of 18, at the following weights: 55 lbs. and under; 65 pounds and under; 75 pounds and under; 85 pounds and under; 95 pounds and under; and 105 pounds and under; providing the contestants are weighed in at Iroquois Falls before 10.30 a.m. on Labour Day, at which time the preliminary bouts will commence. Eliminations will continue all day, till the evening, at which time the finals will be held. Silver cups and official badges will be given to the winners of the respective bouts.

Included in this special arrangement are other bouts between noted Northern Ontario boxers, and should provide a full evening of entertainment for sports enthusiasts.

Other competitors weighing more than the above weights will box in their class from flyweight to welterweight on the same evening.

These boxing matches have been included in a full programme for an entertaining day of sports, sponsored by the Labour Day Committee, to be held in the annual Labour Day in Iroquois Falls, and will provide much interest for all attending.

Glasgow Rangers Hold Interest in Soccer Test

Scotland's Footballers Have Finished Training and are Ready for Campaign.

Glasgow, Aug. 12.—Scotland's footballers have finished pre-season training and on Saturday the 38 clubs that make up the Scottish League's two divisions started the long campaign that ends late in April.

Interest again centres on Glasgow Rangers—one of the world's greatest soccer clubs. During the close season staff and experts expect them to again set the pace for league honors. Last winter the Rangers won their 24th title in a canter, finishing 11 points ahead of Celtic, runner-up.

Relegation of Queen's Park, famous amateur aggregation, to the second division along with Raith Rovers, is deplored throughout the country. The club will play in junior football for the second time in its long history. The amateurs played in the second division in the 1921-22 campaign, regaining senior status the following year.

Coming in to the major league are Cowdenbeath and Alloa. The teams who pack plenty of strength on the attack have played in senior football previously. Cowdenbeath was in the first division as recently as 1933-34 but its partner in promotion played with top ranking clubs back in the 1920's.

Several Scottish players have been affected by the compulsory military service draft but only two outstanding men have been called up thus far—J. McKennan, of Patrick Thistle, and J. Galloway, of Rangers.

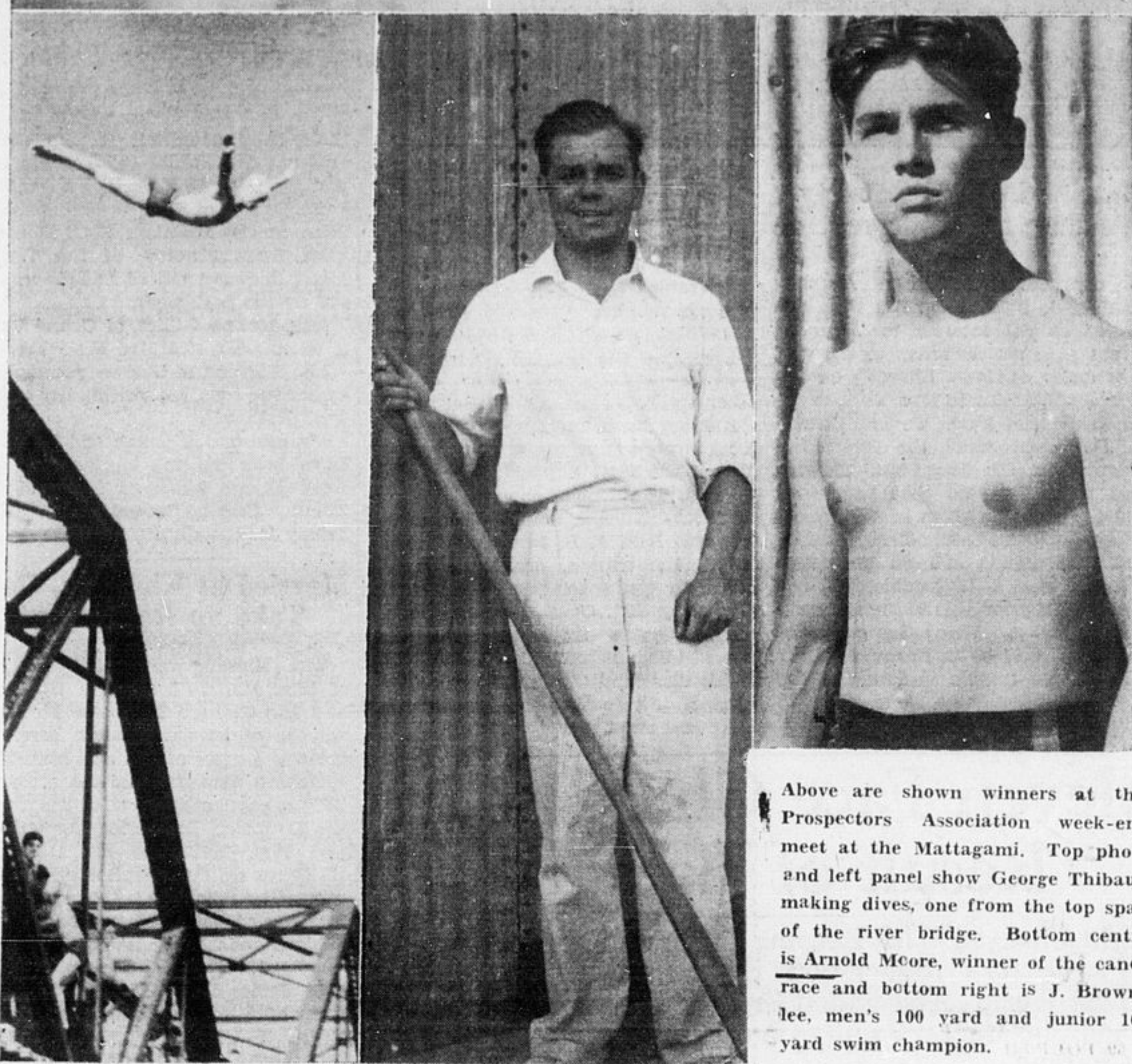
The Light Blues have recruited well during the summer. Bobby Bolt, Falkirk's right-half who toured Canada with the Scottish Football Association team in June, has been added to the Glasgow team's roster along with Chris McNea, outside-left from Hamilton Academicals.

McNea, a clever winger, was capped for the Scottish League against the Irish League in 1938. In part payment for McNea, Rangers sent R. Harrison, inside-left, back to Hamilton. Bobby Main, speedy outside-right, has been released by Rangers and the international is still without a club.

First Division clubs have registered nearly 470 players. There are 30 on Rangers' list, one more than Celtic. Alloa, Albion Rovers and Arbroath have less than 20 each.

Hollinger Play-off Chances Fade After Defeat on Friday

Lost First Game in New Park to Hard-Hitting McIntyre Team. George McShane Does Stellar Job in Pitcher's Box for the Macmen. Cherevaty Replaces Zalba For Hollinger in Sixth Inning After Five Runs Scored.

N.O.H.A. Has Won Dispute Over Trail Players

The Northern Ontario Hockey Association has apparently won two-thirds of its battle with the C.A.H.A. over the three former Trail players who are now located in Kirkland Lake.

A dispatch today from Edmonton states that Dr. W. G. Hardy, president of the C.A.H.A., Thursday night announced that the transfers of Dick Kowcinak and Johnny McCredy from Trail, B.C., to Northern Ontario have been "approved."

No mention was made of Mel Snowden, the third Trail player in the group at Lake Shore.

Earlier in the summer it was announced that Kowcinak, McCredy and Snowden would be ineligible to perform for Lake Shore during the coming season because they had not observed the May 15 East-West residence deadline.

The N.O.H.A. held that as the trio travelled Europe with the Trail Smoke Eaters last season they were eligible to move east after May 15 according to 1939 rules. It was said that the three could have been in Kirkland Lake much earlier than May 15, but remained in Trail to attend a testimonial banquet.

Proper transfers must be obtained by eight hockey players from Ontario and Quebec if they intend to do their playing next winter with Edinburgh Rockets in the newly formed Scottish Amateur Hockey League, Dr. Hardy also announced.

George Kelly, of Galt, Ont., who played last year with Hershey Bears in the Eastern United States Amateur Hockey League, said he and seven other Ontario and Quebec players had been signed by Edinburgh.

If the eight go overseas without first obtaining proper transfers they will be suspended by the C.A.H.A., Dr. Hardy said. This would mean automatic suspension in organized amateur and professional hockey everywhere.

Ball players' spiked shoes gave the new Hollinger ball field its baptism of fire on Friday afternoon. The virgin greensward was the scene of the first game in the new park—between Hollinger and McIntyre. The Macmen led by McIntyre veteran, George McShane, whipped the home team 6 to 1 and forced it deeper into the cellar position of the standing and almost out of picture so far as a play-off berth is concerned.

Allowing only one run for six hits, George McShane had a big afternoon. He pitched beautiful ball and it was only his own wild pitch in the sixth inning that kept him away from a shut-out. The Hollinger used two men, Bill Zalba took a beating for five innings and was replaced by Cherevaty. The relief pitcher held the visitors scoreless except for one run—and it was not earned.

Good fielding on the part of both nines managed to keep the score sheet clear in the first two innings. In the third however, two Macmen walked and a third one singled to load the bases. Thayer hit one out Fargher, on the Hollinger second base. The ball was not so hard hit that the Holly second sacker could not have trapped it but he allowed it to get away and two runs came in.

In the fifth the Macmen rallied again. Webber hit a short one just over the pitcher and Thompson, Hollinger third baseman, was not able to get his hands on it. Richardson singled and Dunn sacrificed to advance both men. McNeill's triple scored both men.

McNeill came in on Thayer's drive to almost the same spot. Another error at the Hollinger second base put Quinn on and when Cooke singled Thayer scored.

Fargher redeemed himself somewhat in the sixth when he doubled to right field. Rudel's fly-out advanced him and he scored on George McShane's wild pitch to the plate.
