340 Veterans are Registered Here 35 Guards Hired

Red Cross Meeting Held Last Night. To Stage Drive Here in October.

Mr. Austin Neame, Zone Commander of the Canadian Legion, said this morning that registration of ex-servicemen for home duty during the present crisis now totalled 340. Approximately thirty-five returned men have been sworn in as special duty constables to guard vital centres such as waterworks, hydro stations and oil and gasoline tanks and municipal property against possible sabotage.

Mr. Neame said that there was no enlistment bureau here at the present time but that he understood that there were many from this district who had gone to Ottawa and other centres to enlist. A few from here went to North Bay to enlist in the Royal Canadian Engineers which was calling for men.

Others who had some knowledge of flying had gone to Ottawa to volunteer their services in the flying corps. Those who wished to enlist would be well advised to write to the Department of National Defense at Ottawa and make their offers, said Mr. Neame. Applicants should outline their qualifications so that the department might know how to best make use of them.

A meeting of the Red Cross Society was held last night and the local organization planned to stage a drive in the Porcupine in October in conjunction with the drive being held at that time by the national organization.

Quarters would be found for Red Cross workers in Timmins, said Mr. Neame. They would serve as office quarters as well as headquarters for women workers who wished to knit and make bandages and do other service work.

Enter Burke's Through Roof Take \$225 Goods

Thief Makes Circular Hole in Roof and Drops into Wilson Avenue Store. Takes \$200 Goods and \$25 in Cash.

Goods and money valued at more than \$225 was stolen from F. M. Burke's Drug Store at the corner of Wilson Avenue and Wilcox Street early yesterday morning by a thief who made entry through a hole in the roof.

No discovery of the burglary was made until Wednesday morning when employees came down to open the store. They then found that the thief first made a hole in the roof of the one storey building with a brace and bit. He then cut a circular hole, large enough for a man's body. Tool prob-

ly employed was a key-hole saw. The thief then was able to drop into the attic of the building and from there it was a simple matter to break open the trap door in the ceiling of the store and drop to the floor.

Included among the articles stolen were many small valuable things such as cameras, cigarette lighters, electric razors. In addition a large quantity of cigarettes was taken. Change to the value of \$20 or \$25 was taken from a cash box.

Nipissing Central Street Cars Put to Odd Uses Now

Used for Tourist Cabins and in Building House.

North Cobalt, Sept. 7.—(Special to The Advance)—Uses that the builders and buyers never dreamed of are being found for some of the street cars which formerly operated on the electric line of the Nipissing Central Railway between New Liskeard and Kerr Lake, and which was finally discontinued some years ago. Much of the rolling stock came into the possession of Dan Hellens, of North Cobalt, who now is incorporating it into a house he is building in the village. The basement walls of the new structure are formed of the framework of some of the old trams and other parts of the woodwork, all in splendid condition, will be put to various uses in the new house. The panelling, Mr. Hellens figures, will come in handy for a billiard table he expects to instal. In the case of one of the larger cars, Mr. Hellens expects to cut it up to form four tourist cabins. The iron sections of the cars average about 3000 pounds per car, Mr. Hellens said, exclusive of the wheels, and the metal he is disposing of to firms in that business.

Showing Canada Could Not Keep Out of the War

There have been many who have been emphasizing the fact that Canada could not keep out of the war, even if Canada wished to do so—and Canada has shown in decided way that it is wholeheartedly behind Britain and her Allies. There was striking proof of this fact this week when the Athenia was attacked by the Huns and the boat deluged with bullets. Among the hundreds on the boats whose lives were endangered were many Canadians — showing that they are being brought into the horrors of the war by the enemy. There were five from Timmins and Schumacher among the passengers on the torpedoed vessel. Other districts in Canada had similar experience. The fact that all but a few of the passengers were saved and will be no worse for the experience is no fault of the enemy who attacked an unarmed passenger ship.

Timmins Continues in Third Place in H. I. P. Loans

Announcement Made of Totals to July 31st, 1939.

Hon. J. L. Isley, Acting Minister of Finance, this week released the figures showing the number and amount of Home Improvement Loans up to July 31st, this year. These loans number 57,911, and amount to \$24,356,968.98.

Aunor Gold Mines to Build 300-Ton Mill Immediately

At a meeting of directors of Aunor Gold Mines, Deloro township, Porcupine district, held in Toronto, it was decided to proceed immediately with erection of a mill with initial capacity of 300 tons. Mill site is already being cleared and orders for equipment ready for some time and are now being placed.

Control of the property, formerly operated under Augite Gold Mines, was taken over by Noranda early last May upon an agreement that provided for sufficient capital to bring the mine to production.

At that time shaft was sunk to depth of 1,025 feet and 4,146 feet and drifting and crosscutting and 27,790 feet of diamond drilling had been completed. Since the amalgamation, development work has been continued on the 625, 780, 875 and 1,000-foot levels and has resulted in large additions to ore reserves. One of the most important developments since that time has been discovery and partial development of a parallel vein carrying high values.

No One Injured in the Latest Kirkland Rockburst

 Starting with a severe shock shortly before three o'clock yesterday morning a rockburst which shook Kirkland Lake with three distinct movements within 20 minutes damaged lower level workings at Lake Shore Mine.

No one was injured, it was reported after the final check-up had been made.

According to those who were awake at the time, the second shock was the severest, the third being comparatively light. Considerable loose fell in other mines, but no one was hurt. The accident occurred after blasting time, and between shifts.

The bursts were loud and heavy and the first two sounded almost as if they were surface explosions. Quite a number of people, roused to alarm by the bursts, dressed and turned out to make inquiries. Not a few, however, it was reported, slept through the noise and shaking, which was quite noticeable in Swastika.

Funeral of Mr. Geo. Sven Being Held Here To-day

His many friends in Timmins and district will be sorry to learn of the death of Mr. George Sven, who passed away at St. Mary's Hospital on Tuesday, September 5th. The late Mr. Sven was born in Norway, and was forty-six years of age. He had been an employee of the Hollinger Mines for about fifteen years, and is survived by his wife and family who reside at 66 Maple street north.

Funeral services will be held this (Thursday) afternoon at 5 o'clock, at the Timmins United Church, with interment in the Timmins cemetery.
