President Roosevelt in an interview last week said that there was an actual urplus of foodstuffs in the United States at present and that there was not going to be any repetition of war prices like those during part of the great war. To Revive Patriotic Fund

The first bill to be presented to the present session of parliament is one entitled "An Act to Incorporate the Canadian Patriotic Fund." Notice of the bill appeared on the order paper in the name of Hon. C. G. Power, Minister of Pensions and National Health. In the last war \$48,103,000 was raised by voluntary subscriptions to look after the dependents of soldiers and otherwise to supplement government financing in connection with the war. New Army Drill


