Council Asks Aliens In District Be Registered

Enlisting Town Employees to be Given Leave of Absence and to Retain Jobs With Seniority. Vacancies to be Filled With Temporary Employees. Warren Protests Change in Lighting System on Hollinger Road.

Immediate steps to provide for the Unsettled registration of all aliens in this district was asked last night, when the Town Council met for its weekly meeting. The Council petitioned the Dogovernment to take steps to bring such registration into effect as

"There is nothing to discuss with Bartleman. "We all are in agreement with it." There was no discussion.

At the same meeting the Counci passed a resolution to give any municipal employees who wish to enlist leave of absence during the duration of their absence. The resolution assures any of them who are able to do the work their jobs back with no loss of seniority. Any replacements made on the staff will be made with the understanding that they are temporary. Protests Lighting Change

Councillor Warren was the only member of the municipal body to protest an experiment with the lighting system on the Hollinger road. His protests were vigorous.

The Mayor initiated the suggestion that several of the 300 watt lights in the system be replaced with 200 or 250 watt lamps. If they were effective it would mean a considerable saving in power costs.

"I want the newspapers to know my sentiments in this matter. I am defintely against it. This system is working well at the present time and the highway is well lighted. I do not favour making any changes,' said Councillor

Warren. "Well," said Councillor Spooner, "I see no reason why some of the lights should not be replaced in order to see how lamps of less power act. There are a good many people on the outskirts of the town who are complaining that they have not enough light in their districts. If we save some money on the Hollinger road system we may be able to provide them with better lighting. After all this is only an experiment and I see no harm in



WARSAW STILL HOLDS

Motor Road Between Berlin and Moscow Agreed

The French Cabinet yesterday, after a special session, re-affirmed its pledge to fight until Poland is free and reestablished as a nation. The announcement said that Britain was equally determined on this, and that there would be no consideration of hesitation or odds until the menace of Hitlerism is destroyed.

The German military command evidently is expecting a major French and British offensive on the western front in the near future. In preparation they are reported to be making massive troop concentrations behind the Siegfried Line.

It is known that the Germans are constructing a second line of fortifications behind the Line. They evidently do not feel that the Siegfried Line is impregnable. The length of the front where there is active fighting at present is about eighty miles. Berlin correspondents report in
