

# IT DOESN'T WORK

In 1929 a certain political party, aserting its "right to rule or ruin" all organizations affording assistance to the worker, attempted throughout the United States and Canada to have its nominees elected to the governing bodies of such organizations by whatever method they thought might be effectual in attaining that end.

The present war situation must tend to increase internal conflict in societies designed to further sectonal political interests instead of attending to their primary purpose of serving consumers of all creeds and parties.


