STEEL HEIRESS REPORTED MARRIED TO A GERMAN
Ottawa, Sept. 26.—It was reported here today that Bridget Dunn, daughter of Sir James Dunn, president of the Algoma Steel Corporation, has married in Germany since the outbreak of war to Count Peter Wolf Metternich, wealthy young German landowner.

Miss Dunn, who was born in England, received much of her schooling on the Continent and was in Munich immediately before war started. She was to have been married to Count Metternich in October, but well-informed friends here today "presume" Miss Dunn and the Count were married at once. As a British subject, the alternative might have been an internment camp.

Count Metternich, a descendant of the historic Austrian family, was born in England and spent much of his time there, but is understood to have obtained Austrian or German citizenship since then.

British Naval Convoy System Now in Full Swing

London, Sept. 27.—Winston Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty, told the House of Commons Tuesday that Great Britain's naval convoy system now is in full operation and that "large numbers of merchant ships are now leaving these shores defensively armed against submarines and airplanes."

Speaking immediately after Prime Minister Chamberlain had made his fourth "war report" to members, the First Lord delivered a full statement of what Britain is doing to crush the U-boat menace.

"In a short time the immense merchant marine of the British Empire will be armed," he said. "All guns and equipment are ready at various stations together with trained gunners to man them and instruct seamen."

"Our attacks on submarines have been five or six times as numerous as in any equal period in the last war."

Churchill said Great Britain had repelled in three ways to the U-boat menace:

1. With a naval convoy system which now is operating for outgoing and incoming shipping.
2. The arming of all merchant vessels and liners with defensive armament, and
3. With attacks on the U-boats themselves by destroyers and aircraft.
