Collect \$1,000 by "Mile of Coins" to Buy Ambulance

Passer-by Raises Amount from \$997 to \$1,000 at the Closing Hour, Ten O'clock

Exactly \$1,000 was collected by the St. John's Ambulance Society on Tuesday towards the purchase and maintenance of a motor ambulance to go overseas with the first Canadian expeditionary force.

The money was collected by means of the "mile of coins" idea. Some contributions which were laid on the curbstones on Pine Street and Third Avenue between Pine Street and Cedar Street, were not coins but bills, often of five and ten dollar denomination.

On Tuesday morning Acting Mayor Spooner put down the first coins. In a short address he commended the purpose behind the drive and was pleased that the weather was good. Every hope of full success was offered the scheme by Mr. Spooner.

By eleven o'clock in the morning close to \$300 had been collected, and the amount steadily grew, until by ten o'clock at night, the hour when the scheme closed, there was the sum of \$997 collected and on the street, a passer-by raised the amount to the even \$1,000.

The society will raise about \$800 more to make up the price of the ambulance, in some other fashion. Members of the St. John Ambulance Society wish to thank all of those people whose contributions assisted in raising the \$1,000. Members of the Fire Department who assisted throughout the day also are the recipients of thanks.
