Petty slumped down and three ofin which destructive fires had been weeping spell. He was kept in the padded cell until his removal on Wednesday afternoon.

Changes against Petty were five in number. The first was that he broke into the Consumers' Co-operative Store at South Porcupine, blew the safe with dynamite and stole close to \$2,000. Crown Attorney Caldbick told the court that after he was apprehended Petty took police officers to his room and howed them where he had hidden all that remained of the money, \$1,665.

Petty was accused of breaking and entering the Gamble-Robinson warelouse at Cobalt and stealing about \$50 from the safe there after he had blown open with dynamite.

A further change was that he broke into the garage of Claude Souci, in Calvert Township, and took the safe and all with him. Police said that the accused man hid the safe near Porquis Junction after he tock about \$75

Fourth charge was that he broke and entered the store of the Robert Simpson Company, in Kirkland Lake and blew the safe there. The amount of money taken was not exactly determined although it was not believed to

To the above four charges Petty pleaded guilty. He said that he was not guilty of breaking into the office of The John Fogg Company and stealing. That Meets First and Third Mondays of each charge was withdrawn.

Porcupine camp police have been cooperatirly on finding a solution for the series of thefts throughout the north, which were climaxed by the South Porcupine burglary several weeks ago. In addition to the Township of Tisdale and Timmins departments, the police of the other towns where burglaries took place have been making strenuous efforts to bring their investigations to a successful conclusion.

Charged jointly with Petty on four charges was Thomas Walsh. However, when Walsh pleaded "not guilty" to the accusations against him, the Crown admitted that police investigations had not definitely tied him up with the crimes so the charges eigainst him were withdrawn and he was allowed to de-

Magistrate Atkinson read Petty's former criminal record to the court. It was lengthy. He served various small sentences for many convictions on charges of house-breaking, shop-breakschools and Fred Stock, Chairman of ing and garage-breaking. On one occasion, in Manitoba, he served four years in penitentiary, and on another, "You apparently have made your
