Youth Receives Term for Long Series of Break-ins

Number of Timmins Youths Convicted in Court of Varied Offenses From Joyriding in Car to Breaking and Entering Churches, Stores and Private Residences. Gaston St. Amour Admits Seven Accusations.

Pleading guilty to seven charges of breaking and entering churches, residences and a grocery store in Timmins, Gaston St. Amour, 16 years of age, was sent to jail for six months. St. Amour was only one of five youths, all of them just over the juvenile age of 16 years, who were sent to jail for breaking and entering convictions.

St. Amour, it was charged, broke into four churches, including Notre Dame de Lourdes, Church of the Nativity and Church of the Sacred Heart, and from them stole \$15 or \$20 from poor boxes. He pleaded guilty to entering the home of Ed Barrette, 150 Elm Street, south, and stealing a wrist watch. He admitted entering the Maple Leaf Grocery Store and stealing 16 packages of cigarettes as well as some chewing gum and of entering the home of John Teagle, 117 Pine Street, south, and stealing a case of beer.

To all seven of the charges the boy pleaded guilty. Police evidence only told of the articles or money taken from each place and sentence was passed.

Joyriding Trio

The serious charge of automobile theft against three other 16-year-old boys, Herve Brosseau, John Lefebvre and Ubald Laneville, was changed to one of joyriding after a conference between the police and the Crown.

The boys admitted that they took a car recently from Dalton's Garage on Cedar Street and drove it to Kirkland Lake where they were picked up. Sergeant John Downey told the court that the boys told him that they would have returned the automobile had they not run out of gasoline in Kirkland.

The boys were sentenced to sixty days in jail each.

Looking for Bullets

Armand Daigeneault told police that he broke and entered a Wilson Avenue second hand store in order to find bullets. He wanted to go hunting. He too was sentenced to sixty days in jail.

Paul Garant was charged with breaking and entering the Maple Leaf Grocery. He told the court that he was not guilty.

Police said that after he was warned that whatever he said might be used against him in police court, Garant admitted that he had been with St. Amour when he broke into the store. He had stayed outside to watch.

On the stand Garant said that he stayed outside while St. Amour entered the store. "I was afraid, I wanted to go," he said. Admitting that he took some of the loot which included packages of cigarettes Garant said, when asked what he did with them, "Me and Paul smoked them."

As he had never been in trouble before and protested that he did not want to participate in the break-in and tried to dissuade St. Amour from it, Garant was dismissed with a warning.

Tale Told of Heroism of British Submarine

London, Eng.—An official naval "eye witness" told how a British submarine lay on the bottom with her periscope blown off by German depth charges, yet eventually escaped to rejoin the fleet.

The submarine's crew was pictured in the account distributed to the press as having been ready to blow up their craft when finally forced to the surface rather than surrender it to the enemy.

The account said that her navigator was "a naval reserve Canadian Pacific man" but withheld all other details on submarine's personnel and position.

Name Kirkland Schools After King and Queen

The new school adjoining Community Park at Kirkland Lake has been named by the school board as "King George School." The Kirkland board also has decided to change the name of the school known as "South School," or "Poplar School," to the "Queen Elizabeth School."

Thanksgiving Day Service by Christian Science Society

Hymn No. 307, "Shepherd Show Me How To Go," was then sung by the congregation.

The Lesson—sermon for Thanksgiving Day given in the Christian Science Quarterly and read in all Christian Science churches in Canada and many other parts of the world—followed the second hymn. The subject of this Lesson—Sermon was "Thanksgiving" and had for the Golden Text: "Rejoice evermore. Pray without ceasing. In every thing give thanks: for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you." (I Thessalonians 5: 16-18).

After the responsive reading of Bible passages, Mr. Vernon A. Andrew, the Second Reader, read the citations chosen from the Bible, while Mrs. Kinkel, the First Reader, read the correlative passages from Science and Health.

Testimonies appropriate to the occasion were then given by Christian Scientists in the congregation. This period was completely filled by expression of gratitude for healings and other help received during the past year.

The closing hymn was No. 150 "In Mercy, In Goodness, How Great Is Our King," and was followed by the Scientific Statement of Being from the Christian Science textbook, and the correlative passage from I John 3: 1-3 read by the First Reader.

The meeting was concluded with the benediction: "Grace be unto you, and peace from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ."

Frank Petty Sentenced to Ten Years Each on Four Convictions for Breaking and Entering, Sentences to Run Concurrently, Lunges Toward Window. Slumps to Floor in Faint When Stopped. Has Crying Spell in Cell.

Several Hundred Students at High School Hear Talk on Fire Prevention.

Captain Morton, of the Timmins Fire Department, was the guest speaker at the regular weekly assembly of the Timmins High and Vocational School students on Friday of last week. The assembly, as usual, was held in the auditorium of the school, and Captain Morton spoke to several hundred students, choosing as his topic "Fire Prevention."

Captain Morton explained the various ways in which the students might assist in fire prevention work. He stressed the fact that they should be careful at all times, and not only during fire prevention week, and stated ways in which destructive fires had been caused through carelessness.

Thanksgiving Day Not Observed in Rouyn, Que.

The Rouyn-Noranda Press last week said: "There will be no general observance of Thanksgiving Day in Rouyn and Noranda, both municipalities decided this week. Schools, banks and government offices will close, but stores and most other places of business will remain open as usual. Although the Dominion government declared Monday, October 9th as the national Thanksgiving Day, it is never closely observed in northwestern Quebec, chiefly because of the nearness of All Saints' Day, November 1st, on which all businesses are closed."

Lions to Work with Teen Age Boys and Girls during Winter

The Boys and Girls' Work Committee of the Lions Club will emphasize activities in connection with teen aged boys and girls during the coming season, said Douglas Carriere, Chairman, speaking at the regular business meeting in the Empire Hotel on Thursday evening. Younger children had been fairly well looked after during the summer by the playgrounds.

St. John's Ambulance Society work would be taught the boys, and knitting contests would be held at intervals throughout the winter for the girls. Public speaking competitions would be held for boys and girls and hobby competitions for such activities as stamp collecting and photography.

Individual awards would be made for the members of the winning six man rugby team at the High and Vocational School and for team members of the interform basketball championship squad of girls.

Dr. Oscar Stahl said that preparations were under way to begin the tuberculosis testing campaign in the schools and Fred Stock, Chairman of the Sight Conservation Committee, told the club that three pairs of spectacles were issued during the month of September and several eye tests made.

William King, President, was in the chair. Guests were Herm Parsons, a member of the Toronto Beaches Lions Club; Arthur Dodemeade, a member of the North Bay club; Maxie Silverman, a member of the Sudbury club, and Geo. James, of Toronto.

The meeting was well attended.

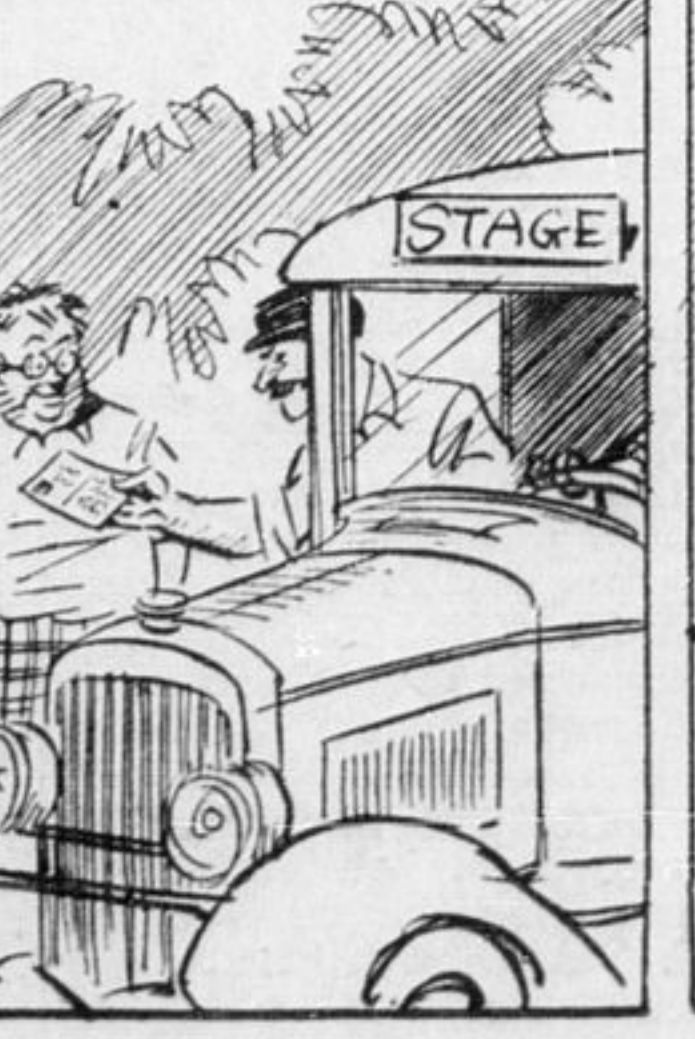
