Regimental Course of Infantry to be Conducted Here

To Commence on October 23rd.

A regimental course of Infantry (Rifle) has been authorized by Brigadier R. O. Alexander, D.S.O., District Officer Commanding Military District No. 2 for 2nd Lieutenants and N.C.O's of the Algonquin Regiment, to com-

mence on the 23rd October, 1939. In Timmins the course will get under way on Thursday, October 19th, with a registration of candidates desirous of qualifying, and a distribution of syllabus to those candidates. From then on the course will be conducted on Tuesdays and Thursdays from seventhirty to ten o'clock in the evening. The first part of the course will consist of a certain amount of Squad Drill and Weapon Training, combined with lectures on General Organization, Administration, Map Reading, Tactics, and Military Law. Later there will be further lectures on Tactics and Field Engineering and Technical subjects peculiar to an Infantry (Rifle) Battalion. The examination will consist of two papers, the first is taken by candidates to all branches of the service and the second is a special paper taken by Infantry Candidates alone. Other

branches of the service would take a special paper covering subjects connected with their branch. Officers and N.C.O.'s who pass this examination successfully will probably proceed to Toronto, or some other military station for a two weeks' practical course to complete their qualification.
