

Dig More Gold Urges Controller Dr. F. Conboy, of Toronto

Ease Burden of War.

Toronto, Oct. 18 .- In order to enable Canada to meet its war expenses without shouldering impossible burdens upon the taxpayers, Controller Dr. F. J. Conboy declared yesterday every effort should be made to increase the nation's production of gold and to raise the Dominion to the position of first rank-

Ways and means of bringing about such an increase in Canadian gold production will be studied at the City Hall in the near future by the Northern Ontario Development Committee, headed by Dr. Conboy. The committee, which is at present assisting in the task of surveying employment opportunities, will draw up recommendations to be submitted to the Ontario Government.

Canada last year was the third ranking gold producing nation of the world, Controller Conboy pointed out yesterday, with South Africa holding top position and Russia in second place. It had been estmated that \$165,000,000 worth of gold had been produced in the Dominion in 1938 and of this amount Ontario's contribution had been approxmately 61 per cent.

"Everything possible should be done to raise Canada into first position among the world's gold producing nations," Dr. Conboy contended. "We have unlimited ore supplies, we have the men, and we have vast territory that has not yet been touched."

British Women Mobilized Speedily for War Effort

London, Eng.-So many British women have offered their services in the war to beat Hitler that the strength of the Auxiliary Territorial Servicethe British women's army-is to be

doubled soon. The War Office announced that recruiting would reopen again for some 20,000 women between the ages of 18 and 43 who wish to join that service. Arrangements are now being completed to house the additional volunteers.

Members of the Auxiliary Territorial Army, who are paid a minimum of one shilling and fourpence a day, have been taking over most of the work which, during the war of 1914-18 kept thousands of soldiers on home soil, tied to

clerical, domestic and other jobs. Meanwhile, the other women's services have generally had to close down their recruiting in face of an overwhelming demand for membership.
