Bastien and Fazano have been contact with Bert Corbeau, former pro star with Montreal Canadiens and the old Toronto St. Pats and former coach of Port Colborne Sailors, and have been asked to report to Midland early this week where the Sea Gulls are doing their pre-season training.

Bastien, whose goaltending was the chief reason why the Trappers were able to force Oshawa juniors to go overtime in the Ontario play-affs last season gets his chance with the Corbeau crew because Harry McQuesten, former Goodyear netminder who was slated for Atlantic City, decided to make the jump to pro hookey and has signed with Syracuse Stars in the Internation-
