

Timmins Gridders Fail To Keep in Running for District Interscholastic Honours

Fought Every Inch of the Way in Interscholastic Rugby, But Lost Out in Both the Senior and Junior Championship Struggles. Kirkland Lake Wins from Seniors and Sturgeon Falls from Juniors.

Fighting every inch of the way, Timmins interscholastic rugby teams were eliminated from the Northern Ontario Secondary Schools Association title hunt in both the senior and junior series when they dropped a double-header at the Hollinger ball park on Saturday afternoon. The local seniors fell before the powerful Maroon and White of Kirkland Lake by a score of 8-7 while the juniors were unable to stave off second half rally at Iroquois Falls and succumbed 14-5.

The losses brought the Timmins seniors' season to a close with one victory and three defeats, not an imposing record at first glance for a school which won the Poupore Cup last year but then when it is considered that the team had many new men doing regular duty and that the players were smaller and lighter than Kirkland Lake the record looks much better. Saturday's loss by a single point could just as easily have been a victory in fact, with any breaks Timmins would have won the game by about ten points.

The local juniors are not through yet although their championship hopes are gone. The Runnalls-Gauthier coached youngsters still have two games before them to finish out their schedule, one at Iroquois Falls next Saturday and the other here against Cochrane a week later. Although definitely out of the running themselves they could cause a little grief with a victory at the Falls next week.

Needing to win by 25 points to capture the group, the Timmins seniors launched an offensive drive early in the first period which took them on a march down the field to within striking distance of the Kirkland Lake goal line but they were unable to work out a major score. Coach Don Clarke's Blue and White crew scored the first point when Leo Bandiera kicked a single but Kovalchuk, classy Lake hooper, put his team ahead 2-1 with a pair of rouses before the whistle. Sylvano Moro tied the count when he kicked a single in the early part of the second period. A couple of attempted placements from well out were tried by the visitors but were not on the mark and were short.

Just before half time Timmins got into trouble when the halves stood around and let one of Kovalchuk's punts bounce around and the kicker came up fast and recovered it himself, giving Kirkland a first down twenty yards out. A blocked kick gave Timmins the ball and prevented a likely score.

Backfield fumbles on the kicks in the second half cost Timmins a victory as the local youngsters did not seem to know how to handle Kovalchuk's high spirals and repeatedly fumbled the ball even when picking it up on the bounce. The first major score came when Moro kicked into his own line as he was being rushed and Kirkland Lake recovered on the Timmins 25-yard line. Minthorn broke up the first play when he broke up a forward before the passer could get the ball away. Timmins fumbled the kick and Kirkland recovered one yard out from where Bert plunged over for a touchdown on the first down. Kovalchuk converted with a beautiful drop kick which would have been good from 35 yards out and the visitors led 8-2.

Timmins started to work to overcome that setback and from the kick-off pushed the visitors back into their own end of the field. Amadio completed a forward pass and then a couple of line plays and a penalty to the visitors gave the locals the pigskin fifteen yards out, from where McCoy snaggled on to a forward pass over the goal line for a major. The convert failed and Timmins trailed by 8-7.

Carson ran back the kick-off for 20 yards and Timmins pressed but fumbles on the kicks continued to slow them up.

one-point lead through part of the second period and half way through the third.

The visitors, who are favourites to capture the group honours as they have already defeated each of the other teams once, opened the score with three points from a placement in the first quarter and they tacked on a single in the second frame. Timmins pulled ahead on an unconverted touchdown by Kosti a few minutes later.

The Falls gridders regained their lead at 9-5 on Smith's touchdown and then put the game on ice with another in the closing chapter.

Local Players Try Out With Atlantic City

Two hockey players well known to Timmins sports fans, Aldege "Bas" Bastien, starry little netminder of the North Bay junior Trappers last year, and Sammy Fasano, Buffalo-Ankerite left-winger last winter, are leaving town this week to try out with Atlantic City Sea Gulls of the United States Eastern Amateur League.

Bastien and Fasano have been in contact with Bert Corbeau, former pro star with Montreal Canadiens and the old Toronto St. Pats and former coach of Port Colborne Sailors, and have been asked to report to Midland early this week where the Sea Gulls are doing their pre-season training.

Bastien, whose goaltending was the chief reason why the Trappers were able to force Oshawa juniors to go overtime in the Ontario play-offs last season gets his chance with the Corbeau crew because Harry McQuesten, former Goodyear netminder who was slated for Atlantic City, decided to make the jump to pro hockey and has signed with Syracuse Stars in the International loop.

This will be Bastien's first year out of junior hockey and his record to date would indicate that he has a good chance of making the grade with the Gulls. He had intended playing for Edinburgh Rockets in the Scottish League this winter but the war brought a cessation to hockey activity there.

Fasano, whose home is in Cochrane, did a great job patrolling his left wing lane for the Ankerite last season and also had made arrangements to play in England this winter. Fasano is about 24 years old and should make the grade.

Another Timmins ice star, Len Godin, got as far as Montreal on his way back to England to play in the British league but the war likewise put a halt to his plans and he returned to his home here. Godin is working at the Buffalo-Ankerite and will likely line up with Manager Joe Raboult's squad, in the Porcupine senior league.

Bastien and Fasano will be seen in their new livery when the Sea Gulls come here to play an exhibition game against Bob Crosby's McIntyre team at Schumacher on Nov. 9th. The Gulls are also booked to play at Kirkland Lake on their training tour.

Choosing New Secretary To Replace W. A. Thompson N. O. H. A.'s Chief Problem

Business Pressure Forces Resignation of Popular Hockey League Secretary for the Past 13 Years. Duncan Sutherland Possible Successor.

When the officers and delegates of the Northern Ontario Hockey Association convene at Halleybury on Saturday, Nov. 4th, for their annual meeting, probably the first and biggest task which faces them is the selection of a new secretary-treasurer to replace the popular W. A. "Bill" Thompson of North Bay who has announced his retirement after filling the office for the past thirteen years.

Mr. Thompson who has been supplying the big push in the N.O.H.A. for years, is the second man to have held the office of secretary-treasurer. He succeeded Harry P. Charlton, of North Bay, in 1926. Pressure of business makes it impossible for him to give the amount of time necessary to fulfill the duties, Mr. Thompson announced. It is possible that he might be given some other position on the executive.

Tribute to Mr. Thompson's contribution to hockey in the north was paid by Dean Kester, Timmins, president of the N.O.H.A. and J. L. Fulton, Schumacher, Porcupine representative on the executive, who declared that the North Bay man's efforts on behalf of the sport have been unceasing and of the utmost value.

Most prominently mentioned as likely to be chosen to fill the position is Duncan Sutherland of Halleybury, a former president of the N.O.H.A. Associated with the "Halleyburian," Mr. Sutherland has always been a booster for hockey and has a wide knowledge of the problems and the needs of the sport in the north.

Lorne Miller, also a former president of the Association, may let his name go before the delegates when the voting takes place, according to North Bay advices.

Any clubs proposing amendments to the constitution must send such amendments to the secretary of the league to be in his hands a week before the meeting. Nominations for executive positions must also be filed with the secretary a week before the annual session.

The present executive is: Immediate past-president, Lorne Miller, Noranda; president, Dean Kester, Timmins; vice-president, Dr. H. C. Nash, Sudbury; secretary-treasurer, W. A. Thompson, North Bay; executive committee, J. L. Fulton, Schumacher; M. B. Auger, New Liskeard, and H. J. Reynolds, North Bay.
