doddering British foreign secretary is represented as "telling off" Herr Batters in most emphatic language after it is learned that the forces of the swastika have invaded Ruritania. Herr Batters is surprised that the British will fight, and still more so when he is told that they intend "to knock the stuffing" out of him. The play is prophetic to the extent that it clearly indicates that the Allies will "knock the stuffing" out of Germany.

Sinking of the British steamship Cairn Mona, 4,666 tons, is not explained very clearly in despatches. The sinking of the vessel, it is said, was due to an "explosion," but the reason for the explosion is not given. A survivor is quoted as saying that the blast came without any warning. It is left to the imagination to figure out whether the loss of the vessel was due to enemy activity or to accident. The latter appears the more reasonable explanation. There were 41 men saved from the sinking ship.

William C. McDonald, of San Francisco, California, who recently visited Warsaw on behalf of the Tucker commission for Polish relief, is quoted as saying that reliable estimates place the number of dead throughout the recent siege of Warsaw at the startling figure of 50,000.

That German fliers are not meeting with much success in their efforts to reach Britain for scouting or for offensive purposes is proven by the fact that this week the body of the third German aviator was washed ashore at Mundesley on Tuesday. One body had come ashore at the same place on Monday and a second body was cast up by the sea at Happsburg, which is near Mundesley.

The weekly magazine, "Social Justice," published by Rev. Fr. Charles Coughlin, of Royal Oak, Michigan, has been added to the list of publications forbidden entry to Canada. The reason for the ban in this case was that the magazine infringed on the regulations of the Defence of Canada Act. "Social Justice" has been described as "violently anti-British."

Foreign Commissar Molotoff in a speech this week said that Russia demands of Finland a mutual aid pact along the lines of those with other Baltic states.

A despatch from Ottawa yesterday said that Ottawa is to become one of the greatest training centres for air-men under the new Empire scheme. It is likely that by the spring of next year hundreds of young aviators from Great Britain, Australia, New Zealand and other Empire countries will be in Ottawa taking advanced air training with Canada's own planes.

Say That Dominion Election Likely Next Spring

Ottawa, Nov. 1.—War conditions and the uncertainties they involve are not the most propitious time to forecast general elections but at Ottawa just now one is expected next May or June. Any such idea would be necessarily contingent on what may happen meanwhile.

The next session of Parliament, opening in January, will be the last session, from all appearances. Necessarily, it would have to be unless the tenure is extended, and the action necessary to that is not proposed. The British Parliament would have to legislate on the subject.

The coming session is expected to be confined almost wholly to war measures, apart from the regular requirements. It might be concluded—some think—in two months.

One of the proposals will be a bill to shorten the seven weeks' election notice by almost half by providing for the preparation of voters' lists before instead of after dissolution. If such a plan were followed the election might be before the end of May.

As he is domiciled in the province, Hon. J. L. Ralston, Minister of Finance, is understood to prefer a Quebec constituency for a seat in Parliament, and it is pretty well understood that Jacques Cartier will be chosen. This would obviate opening any seat by a member resigning.

The death of A. MacLean, M.P. for Prince, P.E.I., opens that seat and there is some suggestion that Col. Ralston should run there. This is also in view of the fact that Hon. C. A. Dunning, who represented Prince Edward Island in the Cabinet, has resigned.

It is still a very open question when the by-elections created by the resignation of members will be brought on, if they are at all. The ridings affected are two in Quebec and one in Saskatchewan.

As regards Kindsley, where a seat has been planned for Hon. W. D. Herridge, the Government is said to have the idea that this is no time to add to divisions on the House by means of the New Democracy and that it can wait for its chance at the general election.

ORDER PROBE INTO ALLEGED SEDITIOUS TALK OF MINER

Dismissing a charge of assault against Joe Zamischuk, Sudbury miner, Magistrate Willard Cooper ordered a probe with a view to laying charges under the War Measures Act for alleged seditious talk.

A witness to the assault charge told the court that Zamischuk told him that he would like to help Hitler and that if he had the chance he would.
