## Abolition of Municipal Elections is Protested

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The meagre audience in the chamber are practically exhausted. Consequently a shudder passed through the audience when it again was resumed at last night's meeting. He had been asked, said Councillor Spooner, to check up on two Timmins stores, which it was reported, were not closing on time as they should. He checked up and found that in both cases the stores had salesmen who worked on commission. It was absolutely necessary for them to take customers into the stores at night for purposes of demonstration. They did that although the stores were not open to the general public. He could see no harm in it.

Councillor Gauthier, who pursues the closing question at every meeting as tenaciously as a hound dog chases a rabbit, got to his feet. He talked for ten minutes. General tenor of his oration was that the two stores in question were open not only to the salesmen and their prospects but also to the general public. He thought that all should be treated alike and saw a weakening of the town by-law in the action of letting them remain open. Why did the police not do something? He answered his own question. Because they could not. They had no by-law covering that type of store.

"Turn it all over to Homer. Let Homer do it," suggested Councillor Spooner. He added that the Merchants' Association, of which both stores were members, had had no complaints. The shoe could not hurt very much if the people who complained to Councillor Gauthier did not bring the matter up in their own tribunal. "They are afraid to I guess," said Councillor Gauthier. At that there was general laughter and the matter was dropped. If they were afraid to bring the matter up among their own fellow merchants they did not deserve much consideration from the Council, was the consensus of opinion among the town fathers.

which turned the truck upright, whence the bodies were taken to shore. The bodies of the two drowned men were then removed to the Ansonville morgue, under instructions received from Chief Coroner, E. R. Tucker, of Cochrane.

Charles Miller, driver, explained to the police that the wheels of his truck started to skid on the grading leading down to the bridge, and after a desperate attempt to right the truck, he lost control. The front end hurtled through the wood railing, to plunge into the cold waters, twenty feet below.

The four young men, who were employees of the McNamara Construction Company, working at Anderson Lake, near Matheson, were returning from a pleasure trip to this locality, when the accident occurred.

The truck was not damaged to any extent, and the driver is being held by White, for questioning, and pending possible charges laid against him.

A thorough investigation is under way by the police, and an inquest will no doubt be ordered by District Coroner W. J. Grummett, of Ansonville, who has been called from a hunting trip to take up the case.
