Time and again Hollinger forwards, down the ice on sorties took punishment for the shoulders of the bruising defence twins. Holoukka who is establishing a reputation as one of the toughest men in the league to get by with a puck, scattered players all over the ice.

First to hit the penalty box were Gordon and Lister. They reclined on their haunches in the cubicle of retribution when the first counter was notched.

Murphy picked up a loose puck near the Hollinger goal and eased it over to Murphy who slapped the disc home. The next goal was not scored until after thirteen minutes had elapsed. The Hollinger power play looked good in the first period only for short spasms. The forwards from the big mine on the hill proved that they had the necessary ability so far as the rudiments of the game, skating and stickhandling, were concerned but they were woefully short on combination and co-operative


