

Miners Edge Out Victory Saturday Night

Fight Hard for One Goal Win Over Ankerite Bisons In Fast Game Here Saturday

Locals and Strong Sudbury Team Provide Porcupine Fans With Best Game of the Season to Date. Bisons Press Hard Against Disorganized Visiting Team in Last Moments but Are Unable to Deadlock.

Porcupine hockey fans went home talking to themselves on Saturday night after witnessing the game at the McIntyre Arena between the Sudbury Miners and the Buffalo Ankerite, 1939-39 Mines League champions. The game was the outstanding sport event of the season to date in the camp and it will be a long time before better exhibition of the stick and puck game is seen here.

Despite a last minute rally which almost disorganized the strong Sudbury team, the Bisons were unable to equalize the one goal margin amassed by Sudbury in the second period. In the last five minutes, especially, the Miners were a badly disorganized team and the Porcupine squad pressed relentlessly in with attack after attack. With five men on the forward line, however, they were unable to click with the goal which would have deadlocked the score. Final count was three to two for Sudbury.

The Sudbury crew are a smooth fast-working team that will cause plenty of trouble in the N.O.H.A. this season. Both they and the Bisons were not as smooth as they will be when they get several games under their belts and the season is well under way but both teams showed promise of power.

Ankerite opened with the first rush which looked as though it might end with a tally on the scoreboard. Morris, Allen and Hepworth broke loose and threw a scare into the Sudbury defence.

First goal of the game came at about the nine minute mark when the speedy Hastie, who last year played for Lake Shore, broke loose and darted up the ice. He passed the puck to Rozzini who flicked it past Kemp for the initial tally. The rush came just after Dewey sneaked up from behind and stole the puck from Godin.

Sudbury looked very fast and very smooth in the first period but both Ankerite lines held up well.

Two minutes after the second period got under way Morris and Allen picked up a loose puck in the Sudbury zone, juggled it up to the blue line and passed to Hepworth who scored the equalizing goal.

Two minutes later the visitors again went into the lead. Dewey went around behind the Ankerite net with the puck and passed out to Shillington who was parked on the goal mouth. Shillington took the disc and scored.

Pilotte went right in on Young's pass in the second but was robbed of a goal.

The game, at this point, opened up wide and there were many rushes to keep the fans on the edge of their seats.

Before the period ended a four man Sudbury rush was successful. Dewey slapped in a loose puck. Assists on the goal were credited to Brady and Shillington.

Heximer and Dickson were banished in the final period when they went into a slugfest with high sticks. First penalties of the game were awarded in the third period but not before ten minutes of the end of the game. Len Godin was penalized shortly after for boarding Nicholson.

Final goal of the game was scored by the Ankerite when one of their men, Godin, was still in the penalty box. Hepworth shot and Sudbury goalie, Carey, came out of the net and intercepted. However, Hepworth regained the puck and circled the net. From behind he passed the puck out to Young who batted the disc into the open net.

KEMP KEEPS GOAL CLEAR IN HOT GAME

Domesters Advance Into the Finals by Virtue of Win by Award at McIntyre on Friday

Referee Al Huggins and McIntyre Coach, Bob Crosby Get Into Gabfest and Referee Calls Game Four Minutes After Opening of Third Period. Trouble Starts When Player Disputes Holding Penalty.

Dome moved into the finals of the Schumacher Lions Club pre-season hockey tourney as the result of a 4-1 victory over the McIntyre on Friday night at the McIntyre arena. The win was hardly orthodox inasmuch as it was awarded by Referee Al Huggins four minutes after the start of the third period.

Bob Crosby, the McIntyre coach, got into an argument with Referee Huggins when one of his men was banished for, as the referee said, deliberately holding. Bill Holoukka, the offending player, argued against the penalty and was given an additional penalty for misconduct. At that point Crosby came out on the ice and took up the discussion. Another player, Sandy Milne, came up to the disputants and began to enter into the melee. He too was given a penalty by the referee.

Official verdict was that both McIntyre players accept penalties and that Coach Crosby leave the game. Crosby refused to do so and the referee called the match and officially awarded the decision to the Dome team.

Huggins, during the dispute, gave the Macmen one minute to have two men in the penalty box and also have their coach out of the game—that is, out of the players' box. When the minute was up his ultimatum had not been met and he closed the match.

Both teams returned to the ice and played the remainder of the game but it was only an exhibition match. The Macmen scored another goal during the session, but as the game had officially been called off, it did not count.

Trouble developed early in the game. Near the end of the first period players began carrying sticks high and it was evident that their tempers were on edge. The only goal of the session came when Bill Maki flipped one in on Taylor's rebound.

In the second period the boarding began. Players were tossing each other into the boards with the greatest abandon and it was apparent that fireworks were in the offing. Eight penalties were handed out in the second period and two of them were major.

The Dome scored two goals in the

heated second canto. Les Nevins shot from the wing and the angle drive nestled itself into the twine for the second Dome goal.

In the second Mann, of the McIntyre, took the puck down the ice and drove at Brownlee, the Dome goalie. Brownlee turned the puck aside but Somers took the rebound and slipped the puck to Sandy Milne, who got credit for the goal.

Huggins put the Dome two up again shortly after when he took a neat pass from Maki to punch the rubber into the net.

Just after the third period started a long shot came down the ice and Sandy Milne, on defence, took the rubber. The shot rolled over his stick and while he was taking his time to clear Mickey McCann came flying down the slippery, surprised him and took the puck away to take it in and score.

The victory put the Dome into the finals with the Coniaurum Flyers. The two teams meet tonight and the Lions Club trophy is at stake.

See Hope for Junior Team for Cobalt After All

Halleybury, Nov. 25.—Prospects that the Central Group of the N.O.H.A. will be represented in the junior series during the coming winter appeared brighter over last week-end with the announcement that Cobalt probably would have a rink available before the season opens.

Earlier reports had indicated the arena there would not be opened because of its condition, but the municipality, which owns the property, has entered into an agreement with A. G. Day, local citizen there, to put the building into shape to pass the building inspector. The terms of the contract between the town and Mr. Day provide that he is to turn the building into an open air rink after this season and that he will be entitled to all revenues for three winters and to the use of lumber available when the changes are made in the property.

Two Sheets of Ice
With Cobalt rink open and the New Liskeard arena available as usual, the group will have at least two sheets of ice for the three teams which ordinarily comprise the inter-town series. In Halleybury, the position with regard to the armory, in part of which hockey games are played each winter, is unchanged and it reported the military authorities are likely to need use of their whole building in present circumstances.
But it is believed that even if no local rink is provided, Halleybury will have a junior team to compete with the others, playing its scheduled games in the rinks at Cobalt and New Liskeard. It is thought unlikely the group will have intermediate teams operating in this district this season.
