## Young Man of 23 Elected to Seat at Cobalt Council

**Record Proportion of Votes Polled at Cobalt on Monday.**

Cobalt, Dec. 7.—(Special to The Advance)—Establishing what is believed to be a record for the town of Cobalt and probably for the Northern Ontario district, ratepayers of the silver city this week elected as one of their municipal representatives the youngest man called to office as a town councillor, Jackie Cohen, who will not celebrate his twenty-third birthday until the early part of next year, finished fifth in a field of twelve citizens who sought civic honours at the polls on Monday and, consequently, becomes a member-elect of the next town council of Cobalt. So far as citizens spoken to in the matter could recollect, Mr. Cohen is without a rival in this respect. He polled 277 votes. Youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. Aaron Cohen, the councillor-elect was born in Toronto in 1917, but was brought to Cobalt as an infant. He attended school in Cobalt and afterwards went into business in the town which had become the family home.

Monday's election also established what was regarded as another record, this time in connection with the proportion of the available vote polled. While definite check has not been made on the figures, the fact that 852 citizens exercised their franchise is stated to represent a much higher average than usual at a civic election. The voters' lists contain considerably more than a thousand names, but many of these are of persons who have left the town and are now living in other parts of the district. ## Four Attempts Made to Wreck Freights on T. & N. O. Railway

**Young Man at North Bay Held in Custody to Await Trial on Friday.**

North Bay, Dec. 6.—Arresting Harry Dietrich, 17-year-old youth, formerly of Kitchener, Ont., on the T. & N. O. right-of-way Friday night, Railway Investigator R. Swan, of North Bay, solved the mystery that shrouded four attempts to wreck T. & N. O. trains in the past few weeks.

Dietrich, who has resided for the past two years at 183 Hammond Street in this city, couldn't give an explanation of his mad actions, other than to say "I wanted to see what a tie would do on the tracks."

Magistrate J. H. McCurry, before whom the young man appeared Saturday morning, remanded him until December 8 for trial, in custody.

"I cannot understand what would make a boy of that age do what he did," the magistrate commented.

"Either he has the mentality of a child or there is something in the background to account for his actions." The magistrate urged that police make a thorough investigation of the youth's history and life surroundings. He is of German descent. While awaiting trial he will be given a thorough examination.

Investigator Swan charged Dietrich with placing a tie on the rails of the T. & N. O. Railway on the nights of October 31, November 2, November 29 and November 30. The youth after signing a written confession, pleaded guilty to the charges against him. The railway investigator stated that the attempts to derail and wreck trains had occurred when freight trains were due. The first attempt was made by Dietrich at Connelly's Crossing, about one mile from the city limits, where the old Fisher street-Trout Lake road crossed the railway.

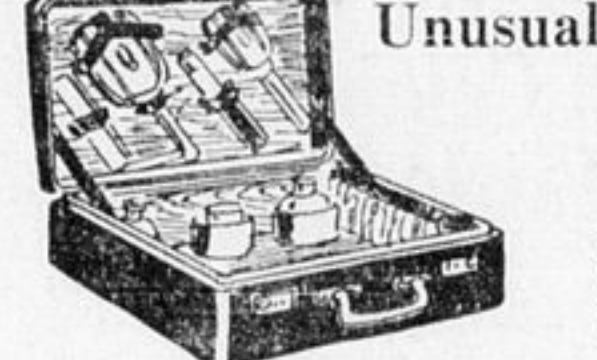
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## The Nurse and The Wolf
