The Advance is informed by Mr. C. G. Kemsley, President of The Porcupine Skating Rink Company Limited, that the temperature inside the Arena was 30 degrees Farenheit while the outside temperature was 15 degrees Farenheit below zero. The inside temperature obviously was not "frigid."

It may be that the comfort of the heated McIntyre Arena has softened hockey fans to the rigours which were accepted as part of the winter game in the past. If this is so they soon will be accommodated at the South Porcupine Arena, which, when its heating system is functioning, will be as warm and comfortable as any artificial ice arena anywhere. In the meantime, however, it is only fair to say that the South Percupine Arena is by no means "frigid," but its temperature allows games to be enjoyed without discomfort.
