Commit Peter King for Trial on Ore Charges Arnold Buck Dismissed

Element of Mystery Introduced Into Case by Police Admittal That Informer Said Ore Was in Foster's Apartment, Results in Dismissal of Charge. Gold Ore Found Valued at \$145. Was in Tobacco Pouch.

Arnold Buck and Peter King were jointly charged with two offences in police court on Tuesday afternoon. The offences were that they first, were in possession of high grade gold ore, and secondly, that they attempted the theft of gold ore from the Hollinger Mine.

Buck was cleared of both charges after preliminary hearings and King was remanded for trial before a judge and jury on the charge of being in possession.

"I didn't know it was there. What will I get for it," King immediately said, testified the police officer. He took both men to the police station.

There, after he warned the men, King said that he worked on the 2,300 foot level at the Hollinger Mine. He had worked there for nearly four years.

The shift boss was cleared, said Sergeant Melville, by the fact that he had not been in the working section earlier so he put it up to King that it must have been either him or his partner.

Magistrate Atkinson dismissed the charge against Buck. In the accusation Buck had elected trial by a higher court. Had sufficient evidence been entered to sustain the charge he would have appeared before a judge and jury.

His partner had given the ore to him. He said: "My partner had nothing to do with it. I'm to blame. It looked good so I picked it up and put it in my pocket."

The police officer said that Buck said that he met King in front of the Grand Hotel on Third avenue in Timmings and King asked him to go home with him and see his new apartment.

At that point Magistrate Atkinson dismissed the charge against Buck and committed King for trial before a judge and jury.

Suzack said that he did not work with Buck but was on the same level. One day between December 20 and December 23 Buck came to him in his working place.

Suzack said that he had not worked with King in the working area as he was gathering old tools at the time. "He made me a proposition," Suzack said.

"Where is the 'attempt theft' here," asked Magistrate Atkinson. "This man is only responsible if some action is taken. So far as I can see this was only a conversation. Nobody attempted to steal anything."
