Bisons Keep Devils at Bay in First Period but Allow Nine Goals in Final Pair

Kirkland Lake, Jan. 29 .- (Special to The Advance)-Buffalo Ankerite Bisons failed to keep check on the powerful Lake Shore Blue Devils here on Saturday night, as the bombers scored eight goals in the last two periods to mark up a convincing 9-2 win over the Mine League representatives.


