

# DOMES PORKIES ARE NOW UNDISPUTED LEAGUE LEADERS

## Dynamiters Hold Porkies for One Period Last Night But Are Outscored in Final Two

Brown, Junior Player With Dome, Shines in Fast Contest at South Porcupine Arena Last Night. Dome Takes Undisputed Leadership as Schedule Nears Its Conclusion. Pamour Hold Dome Scoreless in First Period.

By their defeat of Pamour Dynamiters last night in the South Porcupine Arena Dome Porkies took an unassailable hold on first place in the Porcupine-Arena League schedule. The few remaining games to be played cannot affect their standing as undisputed Mine League leaders.

After holding the powerful Porkies for one period, the Dynamiters were forced to give ground in the second and third. The Domesters outscored them two to one in the second and three to one in the final session.

The first period gave the fans an exhibition of closely checked, fast hockey. Brownlee shot the puck over the boards during the canto and Marshall took a penalty shot but he missed the net. The period ended with the Dynamiters driving in on the Dome goal but no counter resulted.

Three minutes had elapsed in the second period when Maki stole the puck from Reid and skated in on Bentley. He beat the Pamour goalie with a low, corner shot.

Corbett, Hannaberry and Wilson combined on a pretty passing play only to be thwarted in their scoring attempt by Brownlee. Returning the rush, Horne skated in alone on Bentley but the Dynamiter goalie was there in time.

Half way through the period Brown, the junior aged player who has performed so spectacularly for the Dome this year, skated in back of the Pamour net and passed out to Frank Huggins who made his shot good far a goal.

Wilson scored near the close of the period on a combined passing play down the ice. Horbel passed through the Dome defence to Wilson who cut in on the goal. Brownlee made a move out of the net and Wilson lifted the puck over the Dome goalie's prostrate body.

Huggins drove a backhander on Bentley to open the third period and soon after he was sent off for cross-checking. Horne scored on McKay's pass. McKay lifted the puck over the heads of attacking Pamour players and Horne skated down fast to take advantage of the opportunity afforded when all of the Pamour players were up on the front line and no one was back on defence. He shot a flat drive into the corner.

The Pamour line of Wilson, Horbel and Hannaberry, which throughout the year has been one good reason that the Dynamiters have been crowding the league leaders, tallied on a passing play inside the Dome blue line. Horbel passed from the corner to Hannaberry who relayed to Wilson for the goal.

Huggins passed from the blue line to Brown for the second last Dome goal.

Brown sailed in from the side to score. Final goal came a minute later when Dunn, assisted by Horne and Hume, got a fast shot away with two Pamour forwards on his tail.

**Governor-General Hurt in Severe Fall at Ottawa**

Ottawa, Feb. 6.—The Governor-General, Lord Tweedsmuir, fell today and as a result suffered a concussion, it was announced from Government House. Lord Tweedsmuir was said to be resting comfortably.

Exact nature of His Excellency's fall was not certain, as he was alone at the time. He either tripped over some object on the floor of his room or slipped on a mat. He lost consciousness for only a short time, his secretary emphasizing that His Excellency did not faint or become weak before falling.

The Governor-General's private physician immediately examined His Excellency and it was expected a statement on the extent of his injury would be issued later.

It was emphasized, however, that Lord Tweedsmuir was quite comfortable. An announcement of the Governor-General's injury was made by his secretary, Sir Shuldham replied: "I hope not." His Excellency's condition was serious, Sir Shuldham replied: "I hope not."

## Macmen Fail to Obtain Their Revenge from Devils Tuesday

Playing Return Game for Match McIntyre Gave Lake Shore Early in Year, Blue Devils Win Four to Two Here. "Blink" Bellenger Gets Two of Visitors' Goals. Somers Sustains Double Wrist Break in Clash at Blue Line.

McIntyre Miners sought but did not obtain vengeance from the Lake Shore Blue Devils when the two teams met at the McIntyre Arena at Schumacher on Tuesday evening. The Shoremen were playing a return game for that played in Kirkland Lake early in the new year when the Macmen were starting out on their tour of the Eastern American Amateur League. The Devils won on Tuesday four goals to two.

The McIntyre squad held the visitors in the first period when each team got a single. In fact the Porcupine team had a definite edge on the play. They were not able to hold to the pace in the second canto however, and the Devils ran in a trio of goals. Each team got one in the final session.

Half way through the second period, Somers, McIntyre forward, was taken off the ice after a jolting checking exchange at the Shore blue line. Examination disclosed a double fracture of one wrist. In the first period Smith, of the visiting team, was laid out for a moment when he crashed headlong into the boards behind the McIntyre net. He was only temporarily stunned however, and returned to the game.

Early in the game the Macmen had the edge on the play. The Shoremen found the ice too soft for their liking and their play was disorganized. While they were trying to get some order in their ranks, the Macmen were making hay. However, when the line of Cooper, Bellenger and Kowcinak came on things changed.

The speedy Shore forward line worked in on Beare several times and he was forced to be agile to save.

Bowman was banished for tripping Grabowski, and while he was in the crying box, Bellenger got the first goal. He scored for Lake Shore on a shot from about ten feet out and to one side of the McIntyre goal.

The McIntyre scored under similar circumstances near the end of the period. Stahan boarded Murphy and was sent off. While he was in the box, Vail passed to Somers from the blue line and Somers, who was parked beside the net, relayed the disc into the goal.

Penalties were frequent in the second period. There was considerable cross-checking and players were carrying their sticks high. The first goal came when the Shoremen were two men short and the Macmen had one player in the box. While all the Macmen were milling around inside the Kirkland blue line, "Blink" Bellenger broke away and raced up the ice alone to beat Beare. A minute later the Devils scored again when Kowcinak passed to Cooper inside the McIntyre blue line. Cooper back-handed the puck into the goal.

When all men were back on the ice the Shoremen staged a power drive which was successfully concluded when Milton took the puck on a passing attack and back-handed it towards the McIntyre goal. The boot-heel hit Vail's skate and ricocheted into the net.

The game tightened up considerably in the final session and the Macmen looked more like the team which held the Blue Devils in the initial session. After fifteen minutes Vail shot from the blue line. The puck was stopped by Ferley but Cooper took the rebound and banged it back into the goal.
