

Confident of the Progress of South Porcupine C.A. Remus Opens New Store There

Located at Corner of Main Street and Golden Avenue, Across from New Imperial Bank Building, New Store to Carry Heavy General Stock of Lines Carried in Main Store Here. Interior of Store to be Tastefully Decorated

The growth of South Porcupine has, during recent years, been reflected in the number of new stores which have opened in the business section of the community. When C. A. Remus opens his new branch there on Saturday one more Porcupine merchant will have demonstrated his faith in the progress of the western end of the camp.

The new Remus store is located on the corner of Main Street and Golden Avenue. It faces on Main Street. Two large windows on Main and one facing on Golden Avenue will give Remus employees an opportunity to use the good taste and skill in window display for which they are well known.

The store is roomy—larger than the Timmins main store. It is approximately square in shape and its breadth gives an atmosphere of spaciousness. Pastel blue will be the basic colour on the inside. Contrast will be provided by walnut store fixtures such as counters, shelves and display stands.

The floor is to be covered with tiled linoleum harmonizing in tone and design with the other fixtures and colour combinations in the store. A large, general stock will be carried in the new store. Included will be photographic equipment, silverware, watches and the usual stock items such as diamonds and jewellery. A particular effort will be made to give residents of South Porcupine a wide and varied choice in the selection of articles for gifts and presents.

At one side of the store will be a repair room where all the usual jewellery and watch repairs will be taken care of. Generally speaking, the lines carried in the South Porcupine branch will be similar to those carried in the heavily stocked Timmins store. Every effort will be made to give the good service to patrons that is characteristic of the main store.

Manager will be John Bloedow who has had many years experience in the jewellery trades and is well trained to handle every angle of the business.

What makes the matter so puzzling is that Mr. Laamanen is the quiet and orderly sort of man that would not disappear of his own volition, while at the same time he was friendly and popular and without any known enemy so that any thought of attack upon him is not at all probable. He did not have any particular amount of money with him so attack on that score is also barred. He went down last week with some friends to take part in a friendly curling match at North Bay, was around Sunday morning with his friends, but disappeared then and not slightest trace of him has been found since. 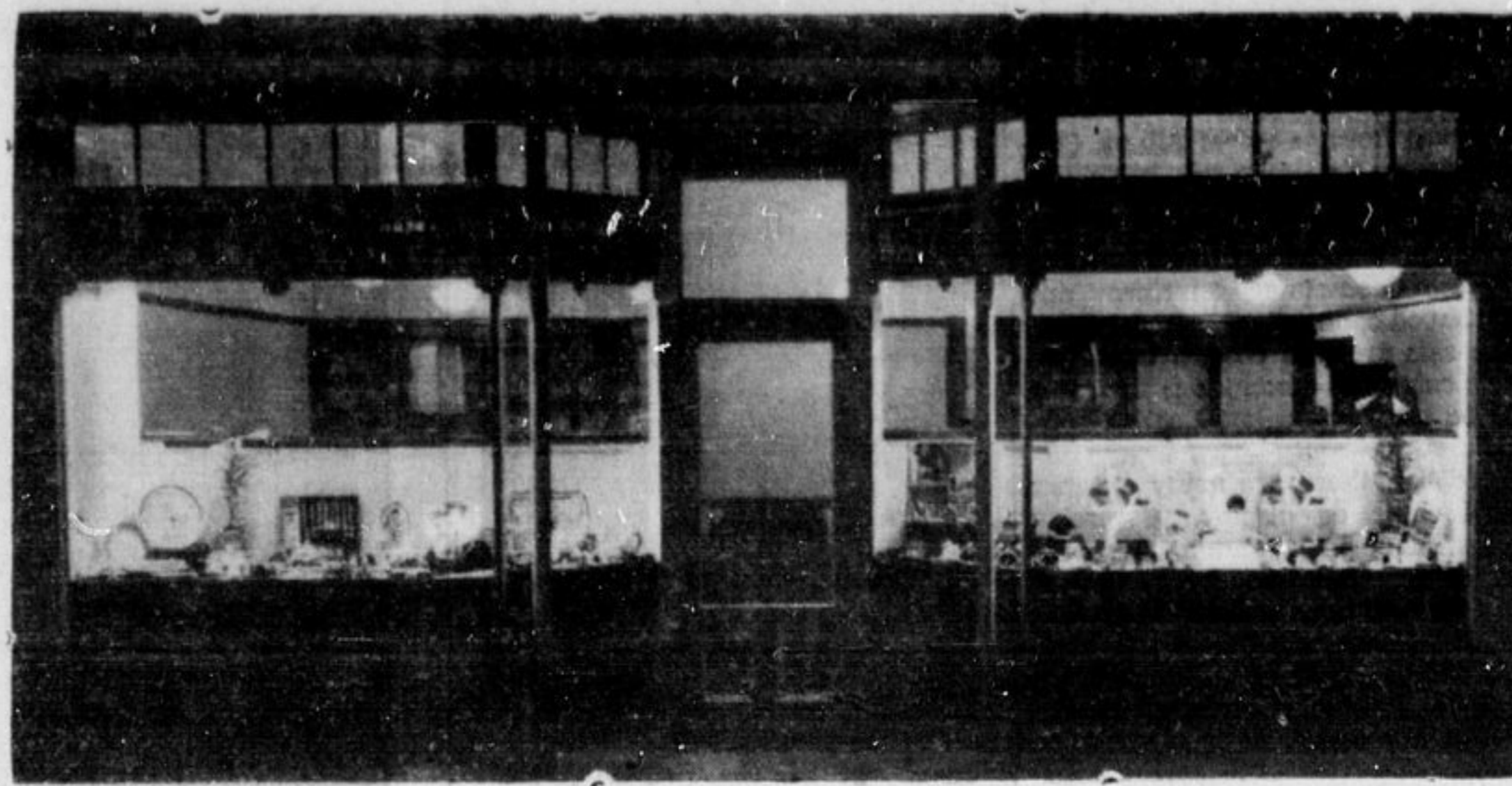

OPENS NEW STORE IN SOUTH PORCUPINE



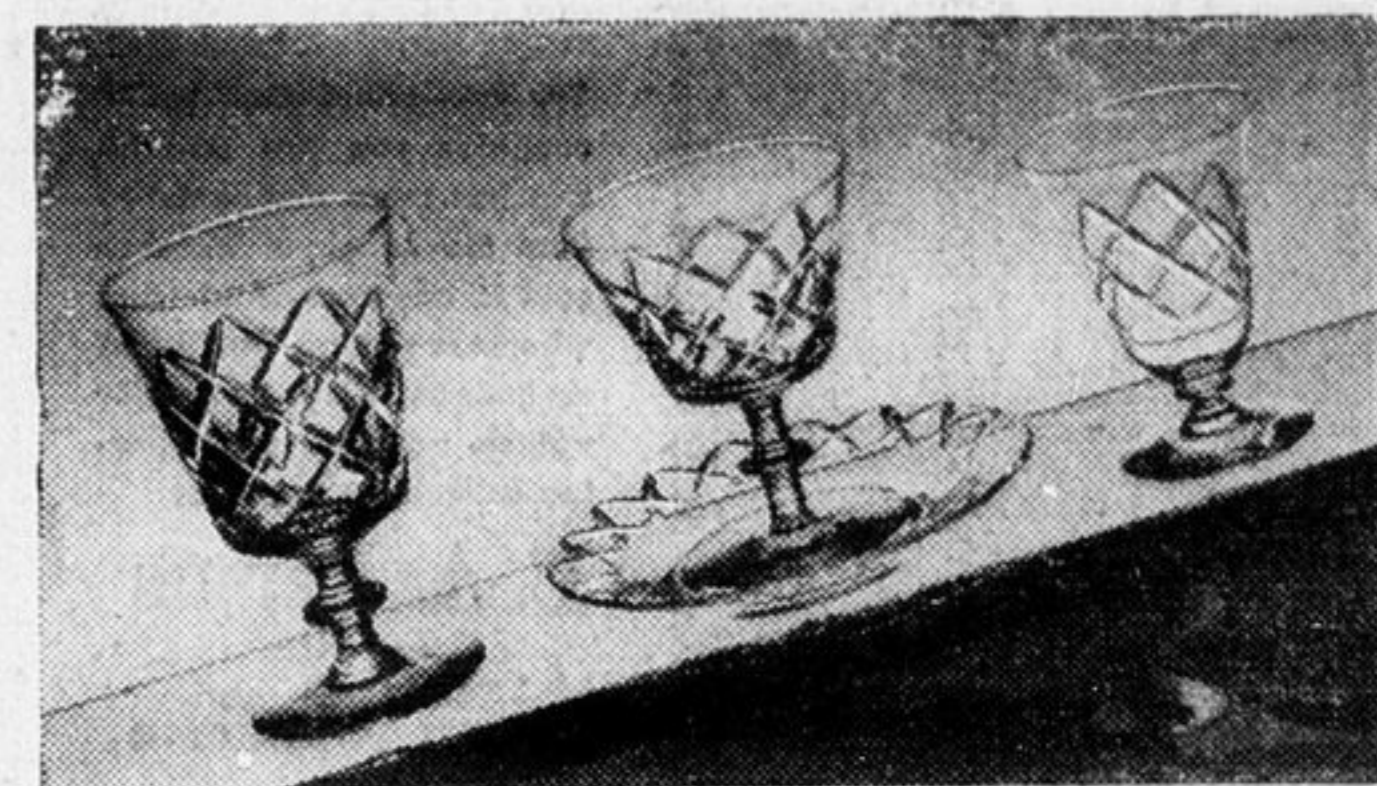
