Medical Examination Might Have Saved Life of Landry

was not feeling well.

Mrs. F. MacDonald, who lives over the jail and takes care of the prisoners, said that she was told by other inmates of the cell block that one man was sick. She called Chief McInnis and in a short time Constable Graeber appeared. The next morning Mrs. MacDonald saw Landry. He said: "I feel much better but I don't feel like jumping over the moon."

Constable Graeber said that when he got to the cell block Landry was lying on his back. He said the pain was in his stomach—that it was not too bad although he would like to see a doctor.

He went to Doctor McLaren's office and told him the symptoms, the Constable said. The doctor gave him four pills, two to be given at once and two more one and a half hours later.

At 12.05 a.m. he called in at the jail and again at 4 a.m. Both times Landry was sleeping.

Dr. McLaren was usually called on such cases, said Chief of Tisdale police Charles McInnis. He got either \$3.50 or \$5 for such calls.

Seventeen years a physician, Dr. McLaren said that Graeber told him that the prisoner had stomach cramps. He said that his usual experience with jail patients was that they had minor stomach cramps or were dope fiends or whiskey addicts.

"A pain in the stomach is also the usual symptom of appendicitis, doctor," said the coroner. "Also the morphine derivative in the pills you gave him would mask the symptoms. When a man complains of a pain in the stomach it is usual for the jail surgeon to send him pills? You know now that it was a mistake."

Dr. McLaren: "The mistake was to open him up at Halleybury."

"No," said Dr. Lawson, "I think the Halleybury treatment was excellent. The mistake was made when you didn't see the man. If you had a son with acute appendicitis would you let him go for two or three days and merely give him sedative tablets. A good thing, Doctor, would have been to take a blood count the next morning. I think it is a terrible thing that because you think that all prisoners are dope fiends or whiskey addicts that this young man should die."

M. Cole, who was a prisoner on the train with Landry said that the officer took the handcuffs off the man so he could lie down on the seat. The officer reported him sick to an official at Halleybury.

Sergeant John Downey said that after the man was brought to Timmins to embark for Halleybury he said that he was sick but that he would be all right until he got to Halleybury where he could receive medical treatment.

In the "Personal Mention" column of The Sudbury Star yesterday there was the following item of local interest:—"Mr. and Mrs. Leo Amell, of Timmins, arrived today to make their home in Sudbury."

Regulations have been amended so that statements intended in good faith to criticize the Government of Canada are no longer an offence under the Regulations. I submit, with all respect, that my remarks were not a violation of the Regulations previous to the amendment, and in any event, I submit, they could not be regarded as an offence under the amended Regulation. I further submit that the court should have regard for the spirit of the law in considering the charge against me at this time.

"As to the statement attributed to me that 'men only join the army to be sure of eating regularly,' I emphatically and categorically deny that I made this statement. What I did say was that I had every respect and admiration for men who enlist out of conviction and every sympathy for men who enlist in order to be sure of eating regularly. Again, with respect, I submit that this statement, which I admit having made, could not be regarded as an offence against the Defence of Canada Regulations as they stood at the date of my speech, or as amended.

"In conclusion may I say that I definitely and wholeheartedly support and hope for the success of Canada's war effort, and that I have never in any way taken or suggested any other position.

"In view of the above and the expense and disturbance that a trial would involve, I respectfully request and submit for your consideration such disposition of the case as you may be pleased to direct so that the case may be speedily disposed of and in accordance with best traditions of the administration of British justice."

The original charge against Millard was revised after petition for more specific words and details was made by his solicitor, J. L. Cohen, K.C. The revised charge was as follows: "That Charles H. Millard, at a meeting held in the Goldfields Theatre in the Town of Timmins, did make statements to the effect that there was not a great deal of sense in going to Europe to fight Hitlerism while there was Hitlerism right here in Canada; that men only join the army to make sure of eating regularly and words of like intent being intended to prejudice recruiting of His Majesty's forces."

Following the revision his solicitor was still not satisfied and objected to such phrases as "of like intent." He believed that the specific phraseology should have been set out in the formal accusation.

However, the case was adjourned indefinitely when Millard was stricken with appendicitis in Toronto. He was in the hospital for some time and his appearance in court on Wednesday was his first here since the early part of January.

During that time two Timmins persons guaranteed the \$5,000 bail the court asked. They were Michael Matymitz and Mrs. Nettie Awdeychuk. Technically the bail should have been estreated when Millard did not appear weekly but Magistrate Atkinson pointed out at that time and again yesterday that it was not the intention of the court in this case to enforce the technical estreatment and that the

Mr. Cohen, representing the accused, made a short speech of thanks for the consideration given his client by the court.

"I am perfectly satisfied with this disposition of the case," said the Magistrate. "Inasmuch as I have heard no evidence it would ill become me to comment on the merits of the case. However, I am glad to see that Mr. Millard is in full support of the British Empire."

London, March 20.—Britain's 1940-41 budget will be announced on April 23, Prime Minister Chamberlain told the House of Commons, and observers estimated it would total \$11,125,000,000.
