The building is located at the end of Bruce Avenue-where it meets the lake. From the outside it resembles somewhat in general contours an old-fashioned extending out into the water for fifty or Canadian blockhouse. The basement is sixty feet. Also on the grounds will be of stone and the upper part of the building extends out beyond the foundation. On top of the angled conical roof is a strong searchlight which will throw a beam for several miles and may be used as a guide to flyers.

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
