

FIRST GAME OF BALL SCHEDULE ON MAY 29

Twenty-four Game Schedule For Northern Section of the T. B. L. Prepared Last Night

Meeting of Coaches, Managers and "Dinty" Moore Held to Draw up Game Schedule for the Year. Begin on May 29 and End Scheduled Games on August 12. No Decision Yet on Coderre Matter.

At a meeting of team coaches and managers and "Dinty" Moore, T. B. L. northern representative, held last night the schedule for this section was drawn up. It calls for twenty-four scheduled games and begins on May 29 at the McIntyre.

There are only three teams in the league this season, Hollinger, McIntyre and South Porcupine. Timmins is not represented. The Timmins team was more or less disintegrated after last year's season.

The McIntyre, defending championship team, is angling for "Lefty" Coderre who pitched for Timmins last season under the alias "Grise." Whether or not he will be able to play for the Macmen depends upon the president of the T. B. L. It was left for him to decide and he is to give his decision in the near future.

Cochrane Swimming Club Prepares for Big Season This Year

Also Taking Part in Plan to Beautify Town.

Cochrane, May 15—The Cochrane swimming club held their annual meeting this week and have formulated plans for one of the biggest programs they have ever held.

Mayor A. E. Wicks, Mrs. J. G. Anderson (one of the prime sponsors of the swimming club some 15 years ago) and R. B. Corrigan, superintendent of the railways here, were elected honorary presidents. R. R. Mitchell was re-elected to the president's chair, as were Laval Warrell as vice-president, and H. A. Ballard, as secretary-treasurer.

The different committees were formed and instructions were issued for immediate work on the pool.

A scheme which is being worked on between the mayor, the superintendent of the railways and the president of the swimming club is to complete the tennis court construction across the road, make a parking place and flood-light the entire area which will create one of the finest swimming beaches in one of the finest swimming beaches in the North.

The position of instructor which had been offered to Bill Bodrug who handled the club last year was not accepted by Mr. Bodrug, as he had made other plans, but through the recommendations made by him and Bob Crosby, former instructor here, the committee appointed Alex Munroe from the teaching staff of the North Toronto Technical School.

The first opening of the club is officially announced to take place on July 3. They have also made arrangements to sponsor a carnival for the last week of June and are planning a big swimming meet on Civic Holiday, a day which is customarily set aside in Cochrane and is considered swim day.

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COCHRANE ALSO PLANS TO HAVE Roller Skating Rink

The old Queen's hotel building at Cochrane is to be turned into a roller skating rink, according to word from that town this week, the present owner of the property, L. Boisvert, a well-known lumberman of LaSarre, Que., having applied to the Cochrane town council for a permit to operate a roller skating rink in the building. The council granted the necessary permission. The Queen's hotel is one of the landmarks of Cochrane, being situated across from the Cochrane union station and well known to all visiting the town. It was the scene some years ago of one of the worst fires in the history of the town, several losing their lives in the disaster. The building was partially reconstructed after the fire, but never finished. Eventually it was sold for taxes and bought by Mr. Boisvert, who, however, did not find it practical to do much to improve the property. Now, however, it is expected that the building will be put into good shape and it is hoped that it will again prove a profitable property.
