

Lay 147 Charges in April Town Gets \$472 in Fines

Police Chief Asks Commission Members to Consider Installation of Two-way Radio Sets in Police Cars. Eighty-Eight Fined or Imprisoned During April. Three Persons Sent to Kingston Penitentiary.

One hundred and forty-seven charges were laid by police here during the month of April, the report of Chief Constable Leo H. Gagnon, which was tabled at a meeting of the Police Commission, held on Tuesday night, disclosed. Of that number, eighty-eight persons were fined or imprisoned; thirty-nine charges withdrawn or dismissed.

Fines collected in police court during April totalled \$678. Two-fifths of that amount, or \$271.30, went to the Provincial Treasurer. Added to the \$406.80 due the town of Timmins was \$65.75 general police costs. The total amount turned over to the Town Treasurer was \$472.55.

During the month of April the two police cars travelled a distance of 5,043 miles and used 345 gallons of gasoline and 29 quarts of oil.

Nine days were lost through sickness by members of the police force.

At the same meeting of the Commission Chief Gagnon asked the members to consider the advisability of installing two-way radio receiving sets in police cars. He said that it would cut down on the number of times the men came back to the station, and make for increased efficiency.

Rene Leclair Jailed for Three Months for Selling

Magistrate Prefers to Believe Evidence of Police.

At last week's court session Rene Leclair asked for an adjournment in the middle of a hearing of a charge of keeping liquor for sale against him. The case was completed this week and Leclair sent to jail for three months.

Police officers last week said that they heard discussion outside Leclair's house before entering. It appeared that one of the men inside wanted to charge several bottles of beer. When they entered they found the usual lay-out—men drinking.

One of the men found in, Henry L. McGee, testified for the defence last Tuesday. He had known Leclair some months, he said. On the night in question he met Leclair in the drug store he managed and Leclair asked him to come over for some beer. McGee denied that there was any conversation about charging beer or that he had ever paid for beer.

A. Mr. Engstrom gave evidence similar to that of McGee. He went in to Leclair's at 1:30 a.m., he said, to "talk to him."

In further police evidence it was brought out that windows were covered so that there was no light. The house was on Pine Street, police said, down a long alleyway. It was located to the rear of another building.

The Magistrate: "It is simply a matter of whether or not the police officers are to be believed." He imposed sentence, ordered the beer seized and the place made public for a year.

Halleybury, May 29—John Molyneux, of North Cobalt, charged with assault to do grievous bodily harm to one Braden Bolger had the case against him dismissed. The charge arose out of a drinking party in which the accused, Bolger and George Anderson were involved and as an aftermath of which Bolger was admitted to hospital suffering from stab wounds in the body alleged to have been inflicted by the accused. Bolger told the court that they had quarreled and had left the car to settle it, that the accused had struck him twice in the body but that he did not know that he had been wounded until some time later when he, weakened by loss of blood, was forced to lie down by the side of the road, from where he was rescued by Mr. and Mrs. Ray McCauley of Cobalt. He did not see any knife in the hands of the accused. The other member of the party said he did not see a thing, neither of the scrap nor of a knife nor anything, in which he differed much from previous statements he had made to the investigating officers.

Police Court

Four cases of illegal parking came up for judgment before Magistrate Atkinson on Tuesday and each paid \$1 and costs.

One case of carrying no trader's license will come up next week.

Owner of a vicious dog, which had bitten a person was called. Complainant withdrew the charge—upon learning that the dog had been destroyed.

"Three 'non-stop' charges, one of being without lights, and one having no driver's permit were heard. All were fined.

M. Rossman, charged with having on May 28th driven in a manner dangerous to the public, pleaded guilty. Constable testified that he had been called to the scene of an accident in which both cars were badly damaged. Fine of \$50 and costs was imposed, the driver's permit being suspended for six months. The accused handed in his permit to the magistrate. "Take it for good—no more I drive," he said.

A speeder paid \$10 and costs.

N. Vallaincourt was charged that he drove a car on May 19th without due care and attention. Accused pleaded not guilty. Police Constable Marshall, of Whitney, testified to seeing him cutting in on traffic, and crowding a car off the road at the Porcupine Creek Bridge. Accused denied driving at more than 35 miles per hour and his statements were corroborated by witnesses in his car; his worship, however, was rather scathing in his remarks concerning the veracity of these witnesses. He said "I ride in back seats all the time, and I know just how much you know, too—The only time I look out is when my driver is reckless."

Counsel advocated his client's good record—he had been driving a car since 1914 and had never before been in court, but his worship fined Vallaincourt \$20 and costs and suspended his permit for thirty days.

Before adjourning court, Magistrate Atkinson spoke a few words of regret concerning the death of Mr. C. V. Gallagher: "I have this morning heard of the death of our member, Mr. Gallagher. I have known him for twenty-five years and I wish to express my regret for this court and for myself in the loss of one who has done so much for the country."

We hear that word was received this morning (Wednesday) that Katie Podbuski recently convicted by Magistrate Atkinson of arson and sentenced to one year in an Ontario Reformatory, who has appealed the case, was granted acquittal in Supreme Court in Toronto, Dean Kester acting as appealing counsel.
