

Hollinger Takes Macmen in T.B.L. Opener 3 to 1

Hollinger Shows Outfield Power to Take Macmen 3-1

Ike Solomon hurls to Bert Cooke to Officially Open Northern Division of T. B. L. at McIntyre Park Yesterday Afternoon. Savoie Hits Triple and Counts Two Runs. Dorey Outpitches McShane.

When veteran McIntyre manager Ike Solomon hurled a side-winder in the general direction of Bert Cooke, who failed the air but not the ball with a hickory shillalah in his hands, at the McIntyre park yesterday afternoon, the northern section of the Temiskaming Baseball League officially was opened.

Two hours later Reg Dorey, Hollinger hurler, put three by opposing pitcher George McShane to win the ball game for his team three runs to one. In the interim there had been nine innings of ball, which for an opening game, was not bad.

Big "Jawg" McShane struck out Scarlett, first man to bat, but did not do so well with Savoie, husky Hollinger first sacker, who followed to bat. Savoie got his bat on one and blasted it deep into left field to make three bases before the ball came back to the infield. Next to bat Lawton hit one out to Dunn in centre field. Dunn muffed it and Savoie came home for the first run. Romualdi's single and a wild pitch brought Savoie home. Hollinger was retired when Romualdi got caught off second and Chase fanned.

When he struck out, Chase threw his bat. It clunked hard against Ridel's skull and felled him like a poled ox. He recovered but was taken off the Hollinger line-up. Oltean was shifted from catcher to short and Joe McDonald went in behind the plate.

Macmen were retired, all three of them at first base and in the next inning neither team had much success against the hurlers who, by this time, were starting to get into their stride.

In the last of the third Dorey got on base on an error at first. Savoie took a low one from Chase but failed to keep his hands on it. Cooke hit one to second and Romualdi muffed it. Dorey got to second and Cooke to first. George McShane went out at first and Webster hit a sacrifice fly to bring Dorey in for the only Hollinger run. Cooke was left on base when Richardson fled out to left field.

In the first of the fifth Scarlett got on base on an error at first and was caught at second on a throw from McShane to Richardson, when he tried to steal. Fielder's choice put Savoie on base and he came home when Dorey overthrew to first on Romualdi's rap.

That completed the scoring for the day. In the seventh however, there was a flash of interest when the first and only double play of the game was scored. Scarlett got on base on error and stole second. Savoie fled out to left field and Bougie, who replaced Thayer in left field in the sixth, relayed back to Richardson who hurled to Quinn to get Scarlett at third.

With two out in the eighth, Cookson singled and Chase followed with a double. Both were left on base when Oltean was thrown out short to first.

With two men down in the last of the ninth Dorey walked Laplante, Cooke singled to third base and both were left on the sacking when Dorey fanned McShane.

The McIntyre band made a lot of melodious noise before the game began. The crowd was only fair.

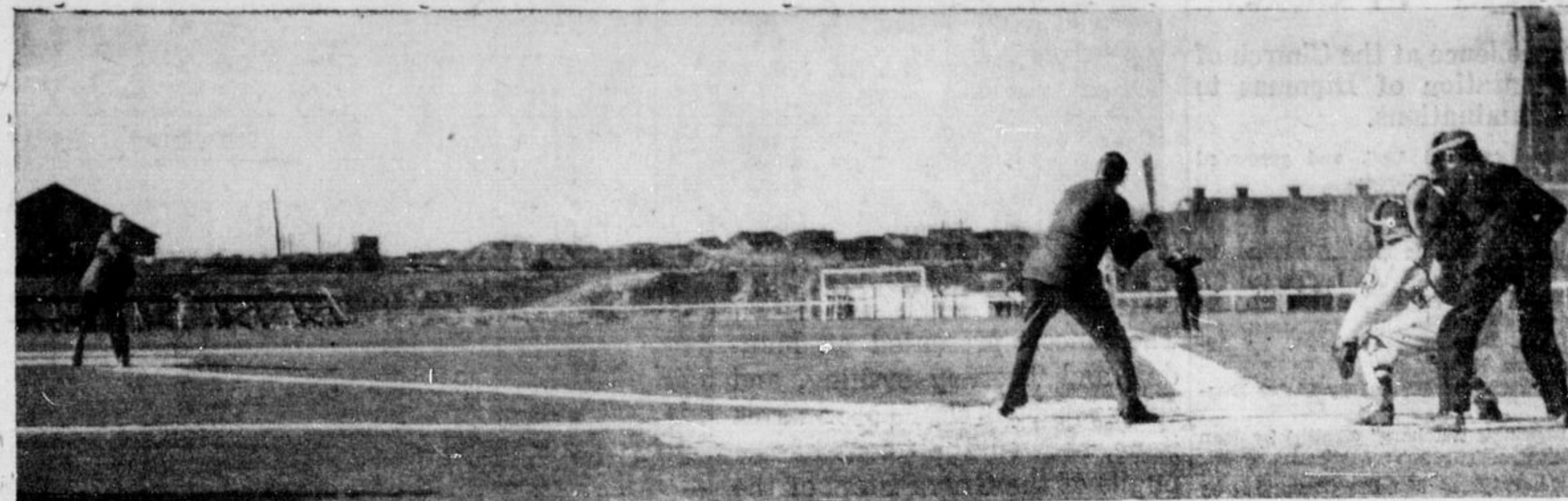
SPORTS

Manny Abrams is Chosen Head of Softball League

Expect Five Team League With Possibility of Dome Entry Being Received.

Manny Abrams, of Schumacher, well known sportsman and former softball pitcher was elected President of the Porcupine League at a meeting held in the town hall on Monday evening. Elected to the vice-presidency was Leo DelVillano. Jack Marks was re-elected as secretary.

Enrollment indicated at the meeting included, Knights of Columbus, Hollinger, McIntyre, Pamour and Paymaster as a five-team league.

It was indicated that South Porcupine Imperials, which were expected to have an entry in the league, would not be among those present when the final round-up was made. However, it was expected that an entry would be received from the Dome Mines in the near future.

An executive meeting of the three new officers will be held on Sunday afternoon. Final entries and entry fees are expected in at that meeting. Each team, in addition, is expected to purchase six new balls before the season begins. They will be handed in and will be used to start the season. If more are needed they will be provided by the league.

A suggestion was made that the league step up from the intermediate "B" rating it maintains at present to a Senior "B" rating but the proposal did not find favour with the delegates and executive members at the meeting on Monday.

Kirkland Mushball League Operates with Four Teams

Kirkland Lake, May 28 — President "Doc" Gould announced this morning that the proposed executive meeting of the Inter-Mine Softball League, called for tomorrow night, has been postponed.

The league will operate with four teams this season. On Saturday the Kirkland Lake Gold and Macassa Mine representatives told League Secretary Don Brown that their athletic association decided against entering teams this season. The four clubs remaining are Lake Shore, Wright-Hargreaves, Teck-Hughes and Bidgood.

At the same time that he cancelled tomorrow's meeting, the president announced that a schedule would be drawn up as soon as possible. He stated that he expected the league to start about June 15. On Saturday Max Silverman, representative of the Hiram Walker Company, told the league secretary that his company would donate a trophy for annual competition in the league.

Each team, with the exception of the Lake Shore entry, will be allowed to draw three players from outside the mine to strengthen their line-ups. The Shore squad will be allowed to use three baseball players in each game.

Through Disaster and Grief to the Final Victory

Nothing Will Stop the British, Says Premier, in Referring to Belgian King.

The following is the text of Premier Churchill's address to the British House of Commons regarding the defection of the King of the Belgians:— The House will be aware that the King of the Belgians yesterday sent a plenipotentiary to the German command asking for suspension of arms on the Belgian front. The British and French Governments instructed their generals immediately to dissociate themselves from this procedure, and to persevere with the operations in which they are now engaged. The German command agreed to the Belgian proposals and the Belgians ceased to resist the enemy's will at four o'clock this morning. I have no intention of suggesting to the House that we should attempt at this moment to pass judgment on the action of the King of the Belgians in his capacity as commander-in-chief of the Belgian army. This army fought very bravely, and both suffered and inflicted heavy losses.

Through Disaster and Grief to the Final Victory

I expect to make a statement to the House on the general position when the result of the intense struggle now going on can be known and measured. This, perhaps, may not be until the beginning of next week.

Meanwhile, the House must prepare itself for hard and heavy tidings. I have only to add that nothing which can happen in this battle can in any way relieve us of our duty to defend the world cause to which we have bound ourselves, nor can it destroy our confidence in our power to make our way—as on former occasions in our history—through disaster and grief to ultimate defeat of our enemy.

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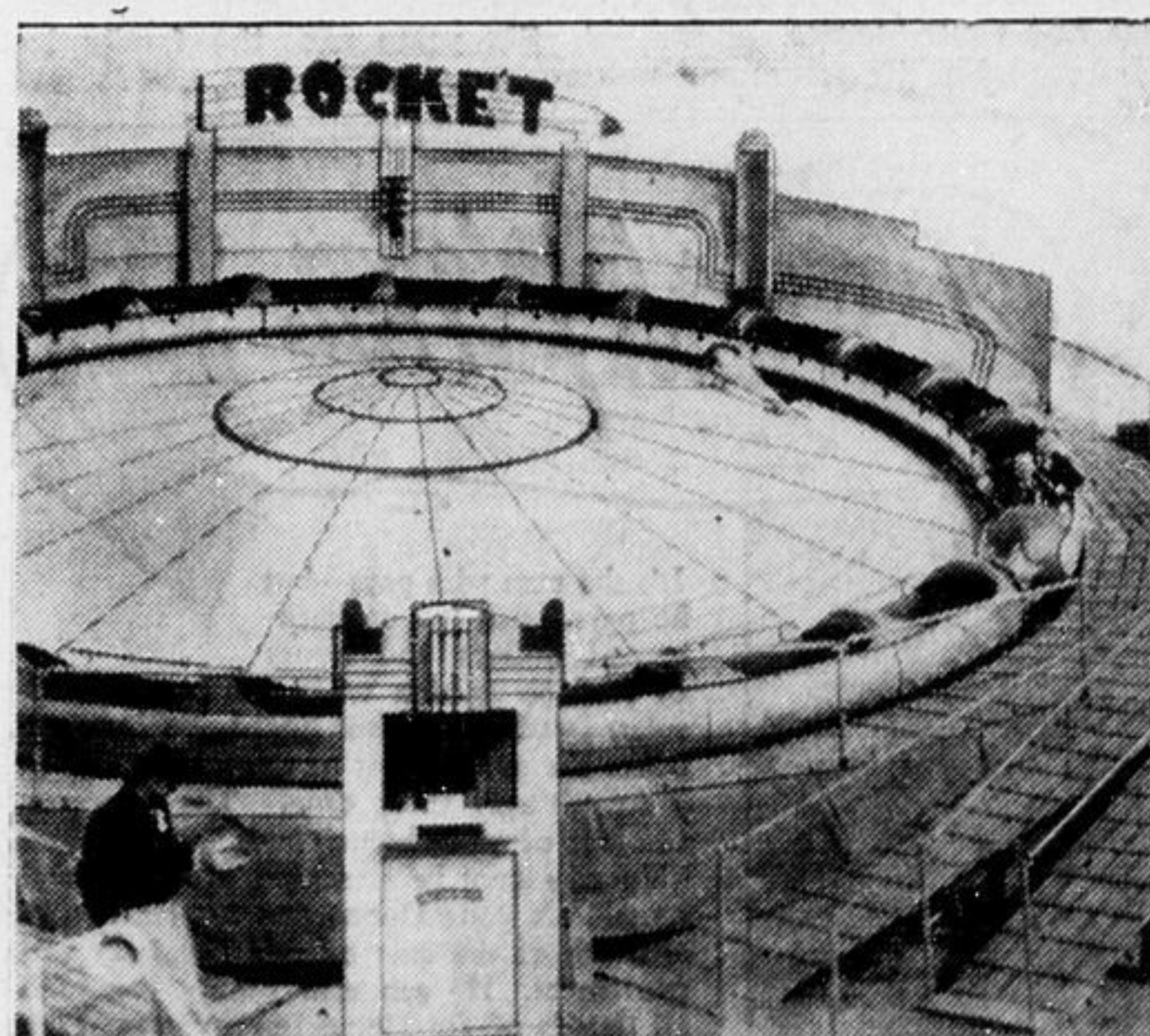
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
