

# Wedding Saturday Was One of the Loveliest of This Season's Events

### Miss Marjorie L'Lena Booker and Mr. Gordon Douglas Hall United in Marriage. St. Matthew's Church Beautifully Decorated for the Occasion. Reception After the Event at Home of Bride's Parents.

Pink and white carnations adorned the altar of St. Matthew's Anglican Church on Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock for one of the season's loveliest weddings, when Miss Marjorie L'Lena Booker, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Booker, of 62 Sixth Avenue, became the bride of Mr. Gordon Douglas ("Bill") Hall, youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. N. ### Romance of Theatre Shown in "Curtain All," at the Cartier

Story Deals With a Bad Serious Play that Was Changed to be Good Hilarious Comedy.

There is a double feature programme at the Cartier theatre on Monday and Tuesday this week. One of the films is "The Girl Was Young," with Nova Pilbeam and Derrick de Marney. The other is the exciting and interesting picture, "Curtain Call."

Turning the spotlight on the "inside" politics and romances of big-time theatrical business, "Curtain Call," vivid comedy drama, is said by advance reports to be one of the most unique films of its type. Featuring a notable cast, principal roles are portrayed by Barbara Reed, Alan Mowbray, Helen Vinson, Donald MacBride and John Archer.

Before the play is actually produced on Broadway, however, the young lady runs into disappointment and disillusion. Even when the show finally achieves an opening night and is a great hit only because the director changed it from a doleful tragedy to a howling burlesque, she realizes that the world of the theatre is not for her and that she really loves the boy she left behind.

A simple yet compelling story, replete with romance, human interest and broad, gusty comedy, it is said to be beautifully played by all the principals and supporting players. Alan Mowbray and Donald MacBride are cast as the director and stage producer respectively, with Mowbray contributing to the romantic thread of the story.

Helen Vinson portrays the role of the glamorous but shrewish star who upsets her employers' schemes by falling in love with the hopeless star, Leona Maricle, Frank Faylen, Tom Kennedy, Ralph Forbes and J. M. Kerrigan have prominent supporting roles.

Frank Woodruff, noted director of many national radio programs, makes his debut as a film director with "Curtain Call," which Howard Benedict produced for RKO Radio from a screen play by Dalton Trumbo. Howard J. Green is credited with the original story.

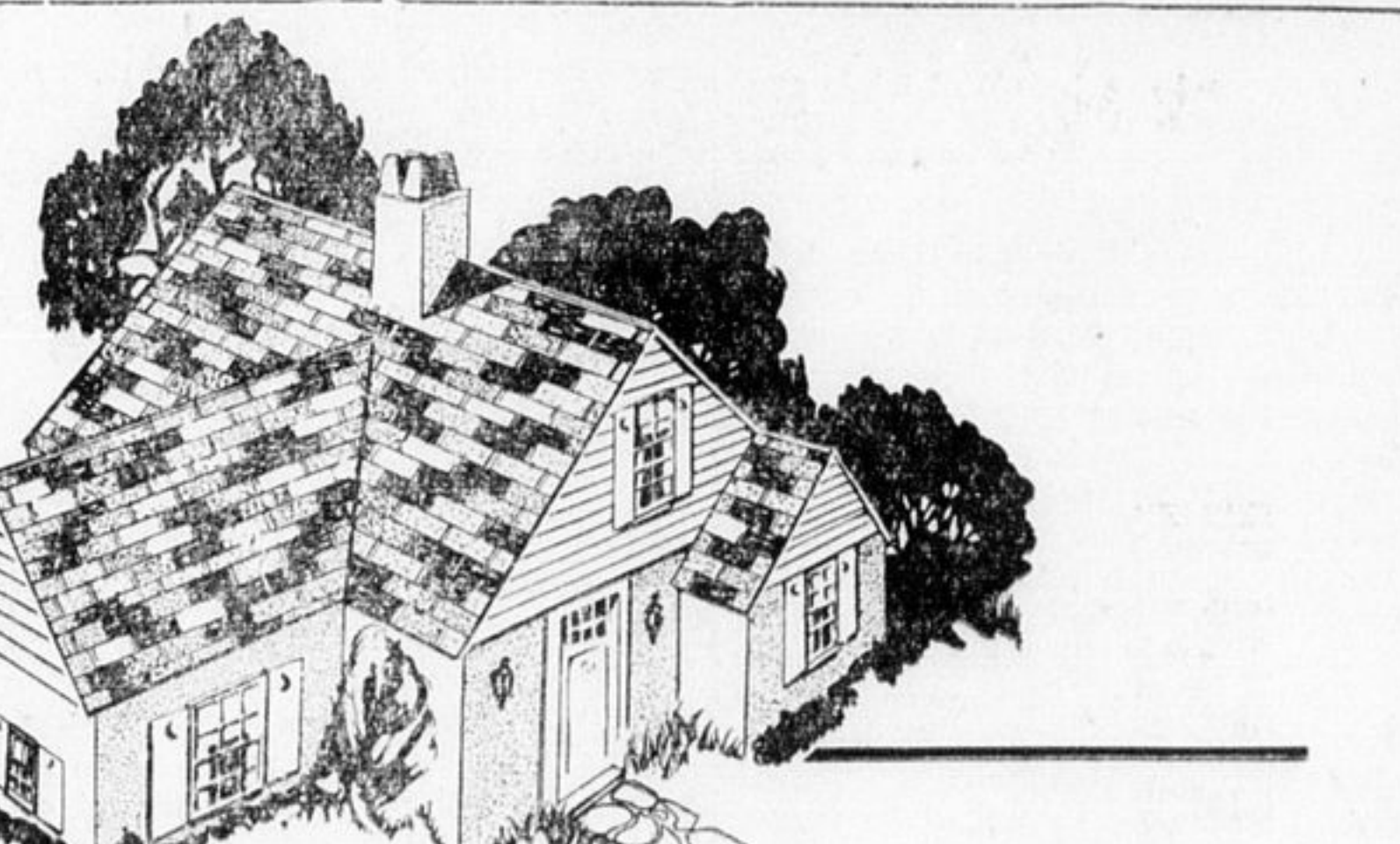
