

Outstanding Numbers at The Second Evening of The National Festival

Programme Friday Evening by the Young Roumanian Club, English Group, Canadian Tots, Croatian National Association and the Canadian Ukrainian Prosvita Association.

Friday evening marked the second interesting programme of the National Festival at the McIntyre Arena, and the long programme with its variety of music, dancing, singing, and costumes was a definite success. Although the attendance was not as large as on Thursday evening, the gathering numbered a few hundred, all of whom applauded generously, and enthusiastically acclaimed the talent of the performers.

Mr. Wm. Edwards, of Toronto, opened the programme with selections on the Hammond Electric Organ, this being a special feature of the programme, the depth and beauty of organ music being given effectively by Mr. Edwards.

Young Roumanian Club
The Young Roumanian Club was represented by a Bugle Band and Orchestra, dancers soloist and chorus, and featured the national costumes of its native land.

The Bugle Band, which led the group to the stage, was composed of sixteen boys who made their first public appearance on Friday evening, and proved that they would develop into one of the outstanding instrumental groups of the camp. They chose native "Roumanian Music" and played it with true understanding.

Ten dancers, Misses Mary Boghen, Helen Donison, Katie Chroney, Doris Buglia, Victoria Zaggon, Mary Zaggon, and Messrs George Majeron and Paul Rivis, instructors; Peter Donison, Jerry Vartiniuk, and Arel Ursachi, were featured in "Alumelul," "Balu-Maranclum" (led by Miss Laura Vartiniuk), and "Caluserul."

"Folk Songs" were delightfully sung by Millie Cojocar, who returned later to give other solo numbers which received loud applause.

English Group
The English group was instructed by Mrs. H. Burt, and Mrs. J. Wilkins acted as pianist. Their contribution to the programme was made up of dancing and singing, and featured lovely little ladies and Master Kenneth Burt as soloist.

In the old English dance, "Mimuet," by Misses Jessie Melville, Betty Williams, Peggy Harris, and Joan Clark, the dancers wore the most outstanding costumes to be shown at the entire festival. These were the old-fashioned court costumes, with the silky white wigs and colourful robes that gave grandeur to old England, and the dancers were talented and dainty little ladies.

In the British Navy dance, "Sailor's Hornpipe," the entire group appeared in the traditional blue and white of the navy, and a special dance was given by three little girls, Kathleen Burt, Silvia Thomas and Margaret Thomas. The group was Misses Mary Harrison, Lois Clark, Thelma Curtis, Doris Griener, Jean Sloman, Shirley Hooper, Betty Deas, Barbara Whitton, and Louise Griener.

Kenneth Burt made a special hit as he sang "There'll Always Be An England," and followed with "Rule Britannia," two songs dear to the heart of every Canadian.

Canadian Tots
"Canadian Tots," directed by Mr. Bergeron, were the members of the third group on Friday evening's programme, and their rapid tap numbers, and pleasing costumes, were thoroughly enjoyed by the audience. Jackie Thompson was featured in an intricate solo tap number, following which the entire group performed a military tap, and three little tots made a delightful picture in a waltz tap. A vocal solo was pleasingly rendered by Miss Gertrude Teitte.

Croatian National Association
The Croatian National Association sent an orchestra and a soloist to the festival, the dancing group being unable to be present due to illness of one of the members. However, the orchestra and soloist were very talented, the soloist, Mrs. M. Banich singing "I Think of You," a Croatian love song, in beautiful voice and sympathetic manner. The orchestra played three selections, "Fall Bluebells," "The Echoing Valley," "In a Croatian Bush," all Croatian songs.

Canadian Ukrainian Prosvita Association
The Canadian Ukrainian Prosvita Association was one of the special features of the programme, all performers being especially talented, and giving a variety of numbers that definitely pleased the audience.

A group of six girls and two boys opened the dancing with "Katterina," followed by "Kolomyjki" and "Kozochuk" by all the dancers, and "Kozochuk Podliski" and "Hony Witer" by the girls. All the dancers again combined their talent in "Hopak Kolom," following which Milton Stodolny presented a really extraordinary dance, which featured the fast kicks and spins that speak of Ukraine, and make these dances favourites with all who see them. Milton Stodolny was an especially agile dancer, whose performance will be remembered by all who saw it. The dance was entitled "Chumak."

A choir, directed by Mrs. Dobrowolski, sang four selections, "Zemchy-chuk Brezhychuk," "Azwidny Hora," "Zvirky Iesh Cholovichenku," and "Stelysia Barvinku," and the director gave a solo number which received such loud applause that she returned with a beautiful encore selection.
