Another Big Shipment Made Last Week.

The Eastern Porcupine District Branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society reports the following shipment of articles to Divisional Headquarters in Toronto for the one week ending July 6th, 1946:

Another incident of making use of "scraps" is noted in the making of a very lovely rug from workroom scraps by one of our Finnish ladies—Mrs. Huhta. The Committee in charge of the work is very proud of this rug.

To those who are interested in knowing what is done with Red Cross money and Red Cross goods and materials, we recommend the weekly broadcast entitled "The Voice of Red Cross" which can be heard each Sunday afternoon. It portrays very vividly the tremendous amount of work done by Red Cross volunteers and the efficient distribution of articles to the needy. This is heard over C.B.C. stations at 5.50 p.m. Eastern Standard time and continues until 6.00 p.m.

The Buffalo Ankerite group of the Eastern Porcupine District Branch of the Red Cross report steady progress in the work there. They met on Tuesday afternoons and Thursday afternoons as well as in the evening of the same days. It was found that the majority of the sewing for the group was accomplished at the evening classes which are under the supervision of Mrs. A. Kinkel and Mrs. E. Keeley.

On July 4th the Ankerite group turned in to the Headquarters of the Eastern Porcupine District Branch, the following list of completed articles:—

Items of Special Interest in Regard to Red Cross Work

Ambulances, Blankets, Jam. Among the Items. Work Report.

(From the Eastern Porcupine District Branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society)

The Divisional Headquarters of the Canadian Red Cross Society has inaugurated the publication of a News Bulletin for Ontario. The first edition of the Bulletin which came to hand July 15th has several items of interest as follows:

AMBULANCES: The citizens of Ontario have responded magnificently to the appeal for Ambulances for the British Red Cross. These will be used in England, replacing those lost in the occupied countries. Approximately \$49,000 has been contributed which covers the cost of twenty-eight ambulances, each ambulance costing \$1,750. In all of Canada, the total contribution of ambulances reached the grand figure of one hundred and fifty.

BLANKETS: The blanket appeal for the French Red Cross issued before the capitulation of France has also had a most generous response. From Ontario alone 42,925 blankets were donated as well as \$7,503.83 in cash contributions for the purchase of blankets. It is estimated that the total blanket contributions for the whole of Canada will amount to over 75,000.

JAM: Under the direction of Miss Mary Clarke, Superintendent of Women's Institutes under the Department of Agriculture, the Women's Institutes in fruit-growing sections of the province of Ontario have been asked to preserve fruit, according to recipes issued by the Department. The Institutes are giving labour, fruit and sugar; the Red Cross supplies cans, labels, and cases and undertakes transportation costs. In some cases even the facilities of canning factories have been placed at the disposal of the Red Cross and the Institutes.

WORK REPORT: From January 1st to May 31st, 1946, there were received at Headquarters in Toronto the following:

- 457,961 Soldiers' Comforts;
- 511,763 Hospital Supplies.

From June 17th to June 22nd alone, 821 cases were shipped, an increase of almost 600 cases over previous shipments. As each case contains approximately 14,000 articles the magnitude of the work of the packing committee is assuredly realized.

Bromley, Goudie Again Returned by Whitney Voters

Elected by Large Majorities Over Other Two Opponents.

A. W. Bromley and H. Goudie were returned for the third time as members of the Whitney Township municipal council at a by-election held on Monday. They defeated their two opponents for council seats, L. Riopelle and Gilbert Whyte, by larger majorities than on any previous election.

Final totals from three polls were as follows: A. W. Bromley, 176; H. Goudie, 163; L. Riopelle, 52 and Gilbert Whyte, 30.

One poll was located at Pamour, one at Golden City and the third at Lakeview. Returning officer was Mr. Strutt, Township of Whitney municipal clerk.
