It is a well known fact that the waterfowl of the North American continent, both ducks and geese, nest in the Canadian north where their young are hatched and reared, and whence they first take flight. Yet by far the greater proportion of these birds are shot in the United States where the number of bird hunters is said to exceed the total population of the Dominion of Canada.

With these facts in mind United States sportsmen have come to the realization that, to maintain a sufficient supply of birds for their guns they must do something to promote and conserve the supply at its source, which is in Canada. Accordingly they are supporting an organization which. under the name of Ducks Unlimited. has been instituted in Western Canada, with an office in Winnipeg, and which is spreading large sums of money each year on a restoration program.


