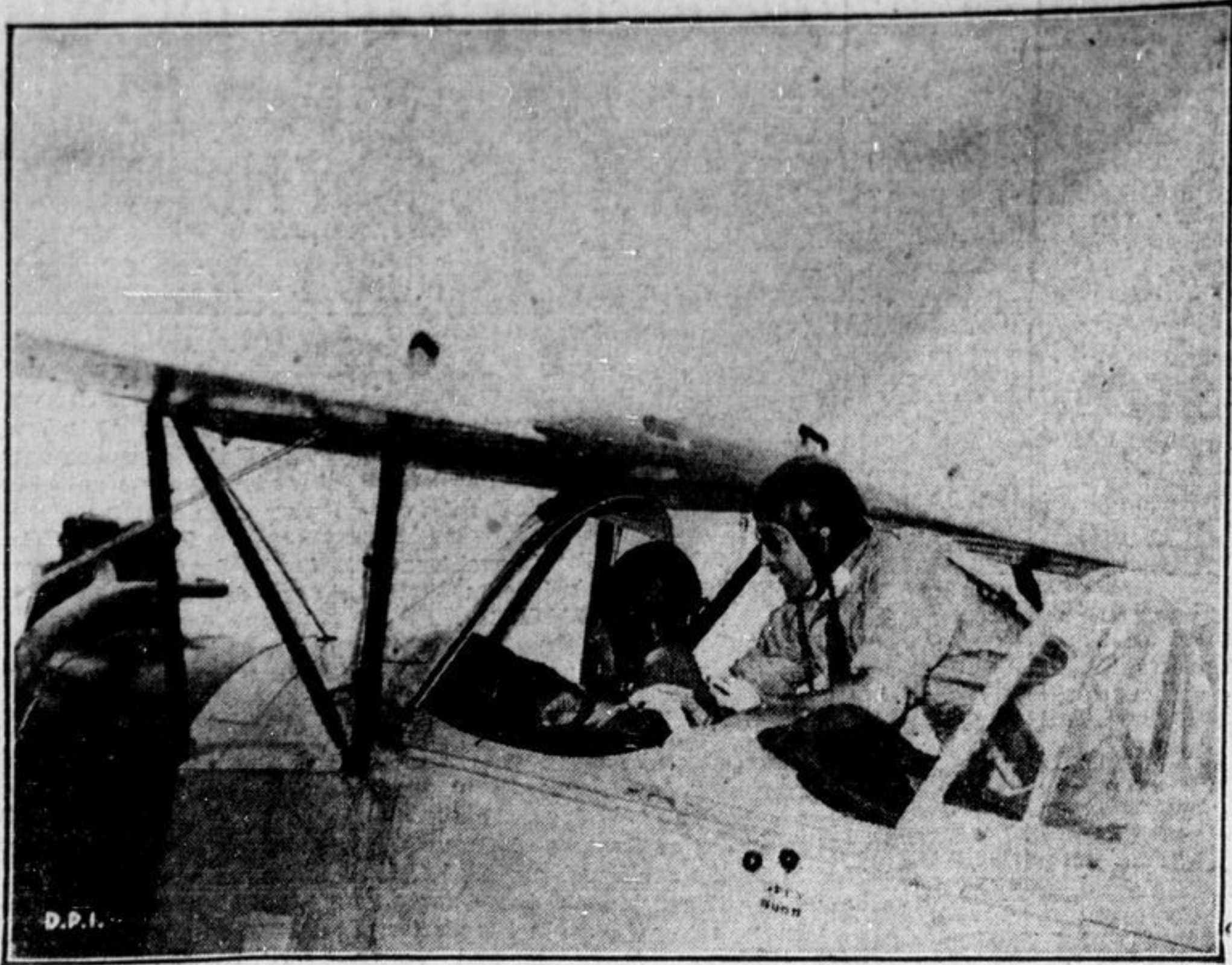


WINGS OF EMPIRE

Two Prisoners Escape From Internment Camps
On Monday two prisoners escaped from internment camps—one in Northern Ontario (at least not in Southern Ontario) and the other from a North-western Ontario internment camp. The latter prisoner was a civilian. The other, as will be noted elsewhere in this issue, has been recaptured at Montreal. He made his escape through a tunnel 100 feet long. It is understood this was built by the work of a group of prisoners who intended to escape together, but the man who got away is said to have double-crossed the others. The tunnel was supported by wood stolen around the camp. There was a home-made radio set found hidden after the escape. Following the two escapes a new system of guarding the prisoners has been started, sentry work being largely replaced by guards walking around with the prisoners. All prisoners will be kept under the notice of the guards at all times.

Italy's Oil Supply is Now Reported as Running Low
Reports from B.B.C. last night suggested that Italy's oil supply is running low and at the present rate of consumption she will be out of oil in a year. Her grain crops are also a million bushels less than last year. Italy is now competing with Germany for oil and fats.

Clever Plan of Six Young Girls Makes \$24.72 for Red Cross

Six of the town's very finest young ladies, ranging in ages from 10 to 16, all dressed up in white nurse's uniforms, complete with cap and Red Cross, had a stand on the corner of Third Ave., by the Imperial Bank on Tuesday, where they were selling home cooking, home-made candy and home-made lemonade in aid of the Red Cross. The girls were Dorine, June and Aileen Murphy, of 164 Maple North, Joan Jeffries of Mountjoy North, Gertrude Cotnam of 11 Borden Avenue, and Velma Prittaon. They opened the stand for business at 10.30 a.m. The home-made cookies and biscuits, also the lemonade sold out very fast and had to be replaced. In fact, business was so good, that had the girls had more supplies they could have easily doubled their receipts, as there were a great many customers disappointed when they were "out of stock" at four or five different times. Eaton's and Kresge's came to their aid and were very generous in re-stocking them. The girls made and turned over to the Red Cross the sum of \$24.72. They hope to be able to hold another sale in the near future and make twice as much. Little Lou Jeffries was their able errand boy and was a big help to the girls.

Death of S. Davidson at His Home This Morning

North Bay, Aug. 21—On a little farm on the brow of Thibeault Hill, overlooking Lake Nipissing and North Bay, the family of Ernest Gauthier and the late Mrs. Gauthier, pioneer residents of the district, gathered from many parts of Ontario and Quebec over the week-end to hold their first reunion in more than eight years.

Five Interned Men Detained as Result of Break at Camp

Prisoners Believed to be Ringleaders in Escape Work.
Somewhere in Ontario, Aug. 21—Five German prisoners, blamed as ringleaders in the escape of Werner Koche, 28, Nazi naval lieutenant, from a federal prison camp in this Northern Ontario area, were reported held in detention to-day while police continued a country-wide search for the fugitive. One of those detained is reported to be a colonel in the German army, a holder of the Iron Cross. Authorities have expressed the opinion the 100-foot tunnel through which Koche escaped was the work of a group of prisoners and not of one man. No official announcement of penalties was made, however.

Premier King May be Added to Inner British Cabinet

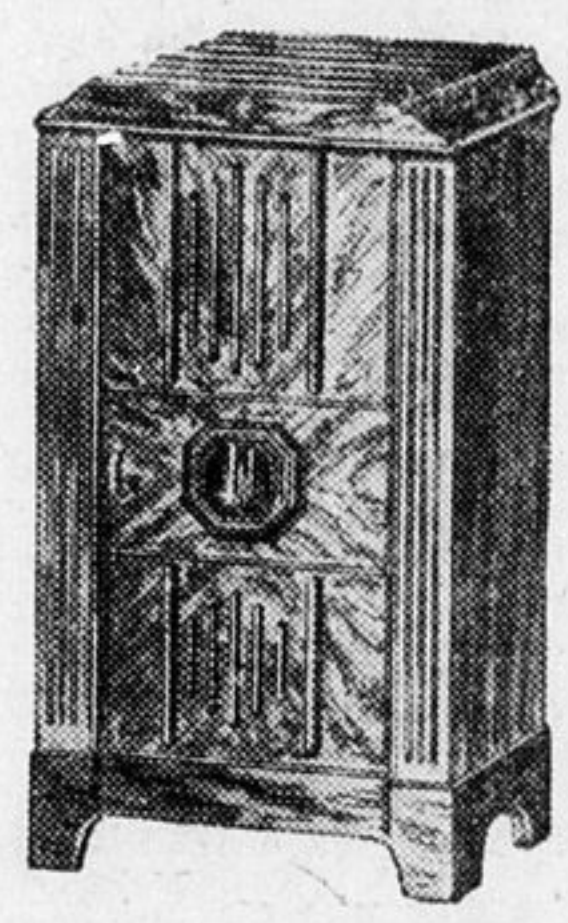
