

Five Interned Men **Detained as Result** of Break at Camp

Prisoners Believed to be Ringleaders in Escape Work.

Premier King May be Added to Inner British Cabinet

A cable from London, England, this week says that the name of Prime Minister Mackenzie King was mentioned in the British House of Commons on Tuesday by Sir P. A. Harris Liberal, when he suggested that a recognized leader of Dominion opinion should be included in the British Cabinet.

"It would be a good thing if the Prime Minister (Mr. Churchill) could call to his council at the present time not ony representatives of the Dominion opinion could be brought into the Inner Cabinet," the British minister

"Mr. Mackenzie King, wise and experienced politician that he is, has the confidence of his country. It is not for me to suggest who should be the leader to invite, but if a representative leader of Dominion opinion were invited it would be a symbol to the world that Britain is by no means singlehanded in fighting this war."

The member made the suggestion while paying tribute to Mr. Churchill "We have our allies in Europe, our friends in the New World and our Dominions responding as free people to give us help."

He added: "I came across a very remarkable statement by a member of the New Zealand Government which is worth repeating in this House. Speakare going to help her to the maximum of our strength. If she goes down, God help us."

FROM INTERNMENT CAMPS

On Monday two prisoners escaped from internment camps-one in Northern Ontario (at least not in Southern Ontario) and the other from a Northother, as will be noted elsewhere in this issue, has been recaptured at Montreal. He made his escape through a tunnel 100 feet long. It is understood this was built by the work of a group of prisoners who intended to escape together, but the man who got away is said to have double-crossed the others. The tunnel was supported by wood stolen around the camp. There was a home-made radio set found hidden after the escape. Following the two escapes a new system of guarding the prisoners has been started, sentry work being largely replaced by guards walking around with the prisoners. All prisoners will be kept under the notice of the guards at all times.

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
