Funeral of the Late Father Emile Gelinas Most Impressive

Late Parish Priest of South Porcupine Highly Esteemed by All.

South Porcupine, Sept. 4th. Special to The Advance. The most impressive service ever held in a Roman Catholic church in the North was the funeral service on Thursday of the late Reverend Father Emile Gelinas. Father Gelinas, the first priest to die in this part of the North, had been parish priest of St. Joachim's church for the past ten years. The body lay in state garbed in the purple vestments of a funeral mass from Wednesday afternoon to two p.m. on Thursday. During Wednesday afternoon and evening throngs of parishioners and townspeople, fraternal organizations, both Catholic and non-Catholic, paid tribute to one whose integrity had won the respect of all.

His Excellency Bishop L. Rhaume said the Requiem High Mass at ten o'clock Thursday, assisted by Rev. Fr. Gauvin, Parish Priest of Lorrainville, Rev. Fr. Landreau and the Deacon, Rev. Fr. Pelletier, sub-deacon, Rev. Fr. Martindale, assistant deacon, Rev. Fr. Jodoin, assistant sub-deacon.

Father A. Sinaud, of Timmins was Master of Ceremonies. Present were Frs. 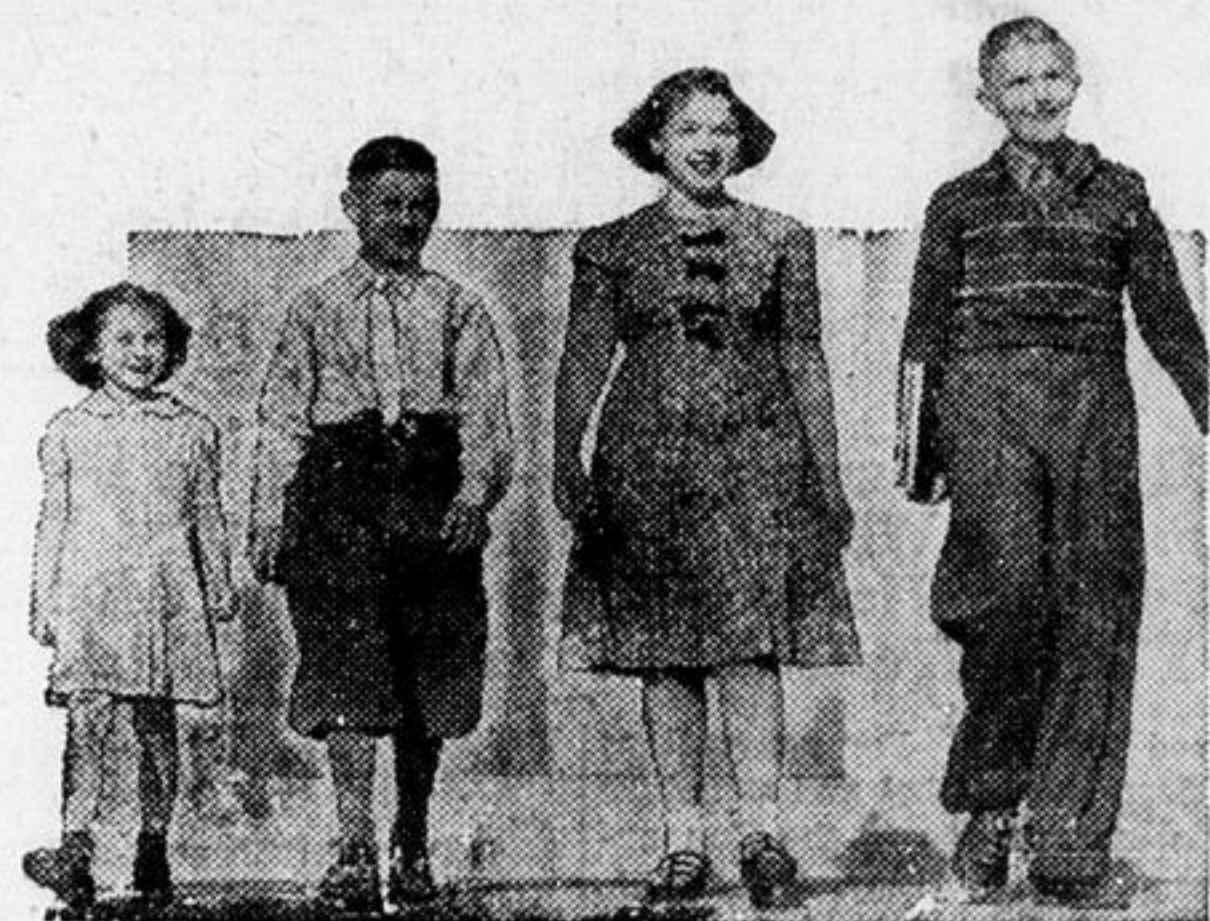
