## Local Clergyman Endorse Closing of Beverage Rooms

The Porcupine Ministerial Association at its September meeting endorsed unanimously the petition of the Ontario Temperance Federation to the Dominion government asking that as a war measure the beverage rooms be closed and the liquor store hours be curtailed. This petition was supported by representatives of the Roman Catholic, the Anglican, Baptist, Presbyterian and United Churches.

Commenting on the matter the association says:—"Our nation has held a day of prayer for victory, yet we have not co-operated in answering that prayer by removing a definite hindrance to our nation's full war effort. One of the reasons for the collapse of France is attributed by Marshal Pétain to the deterioration of the nerves and morale of the defenders of the Maginot Line due to strong drink. A call has gone forth to our nation to give its utmost financial support to the war yet Ontario continues to spend almost \$70,000,000 a year on intoxicants, while the Dominion spends about \$150,000,000."

The Ministerial Association is forwarding copies of this resolution to the local member and to the Dominion government.

## INCENDIARY BOMB NO BED OF ROSES FOR GOEBBELS

A fifteen pound incendiary bomb is reported from Berlin to have fallen sixteen feet from the residence of Propaganda Minister Paul Joseph Goebbels on Herman Goering Strasse in the centre of Berlin. The bombs tore a deep hole in the Goebbels garden and destroyed a bed of roses.
